OREGON MOTOR LAWS

The belief has developed in some sections of the state that persons under the age of sixteen years may, under certain circumstances, obtain licenses or permits to operate motor vehicles. Such is not the case. The Operator's Law (Section 4, Chapter 3, Laws Special Session, 1920) specifically prohibits the issuance of a license or permit to any person under the age of sixteen years, whether or not such person be the owner of any motor vehicle, shall permit any person who is less than sixteen years of age to operate or drive any such motor vehicle or employ any person to operate or drive any such motor vehicle who is less than eighteen years of age and a licensed operator or chauffeur.

Section 5 of this law provides for the issuance by the Secretary of State of special licenses or permits to persons who are physically incapacitated, and the term "physically incapacitated" is defined to include "any person who has lost the use of one hand or one foot, or who has lost the use of both feet, or whose eyesight or hearing are greatly impaired." The impression seems to exist among some that under the terms of Section 5, a special license or permit may be issued to a person under sixteen years of age, but the Attorney General has held that such a conclusion is erroneous. In no part of the law is there any authority given to the Secretary of State or any other officer to issue to a person less than sixteen years of age a license or permit to operate a motor vehicle, under any circumstances whatever.

Some doubt has also arisen with reference to the status under this law of a nonresident motor vehicle operator. Upon this point the Attorney General has ruled that while the Operator's Law is silent in this respect, yet by reason of the fact that the Motor Vehicle Law, of which the Operator's Law is a part, does not specifically exempt nonresident owners from registering their cars, by a logical reasoning it must be assumed that the legislature intended to exempt nonresident operators from obtaining operators' licenses or permits. This fact, together with the fact that there is some question as to the authority of the state to enforce the operator's regulations against residents of other states, makes it advisable, in the opinion of the Attorney General, to withhold the enforcement of the Operator's Law against nonresident operators who have complied with the laws of their own state regulating the operation of motor vehicles, until such time as the legislature shall meet and correct the problem by appropriate legislation. For this reason, the field deputies or inspectors who shall be appointed by the Secretary of State, to aid the regular peace officers in the enforcement of the provisions of the motor vehicle law, will be instructed not to enforce the operator's license requirement as to nonresident operators when operating their motor vehicles in passing through this state within the period of the exemption provision.
