SARAH ELLEN LOGAN, STATE PIONEER, DIES

Mrs. Sarah Ellen Logan died at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon at her home on Fifth and E streets following a short illness as the result of a stroke of paralysis Sunday.

Mrs. Sarah Logan was well known in later and had lived here for a number of years. She was 74 years old at the time of her death. She was a native of Wisconsin, but one of the pioneers of Oregon, having crossed the plains by ox team with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Conney, when she was 9 years of age. Her first home in Oregon was at Eugene where she spent her girlhood days.

Sarah E. Logan was the mother of 12 children, six of whom survive her and were at her bedside at the time of her death. They were Mrs. Ida Wells of Coeur d'Alene; Troy Mays of Hornbrook, Calif.; Roscoe Mays, of Baker; Judson Mays of Trall, British Columbia; Mrs. Cora McLain of Cascade, Montana, and Mrs. L. J. Lewis of Baker.—Baker Herald.

Mrs. Logan was the wife of Sam Logan, and was a former resident of this section.
