A LAST WORD

Before our next issue a new Court will have control of county affairs. We wish them a pleasant and successful term of office.

The acts of the old Court are matters of the past. Their acts did not always have our approval, but in justice to them believe they did what they thought was for the best interests of all.

They were confronted with many very hard problems. They took us through the troubled and unsettled conditions of a world war.

They took the county with a heavy warrant indebtedness and turned it back with the indebtedness paid. The county warrants are now paid with cash from the treasurer's office.

They took the county through the transition from light horse-drawn vehicles to heavy motor drawn vehicles—to do this nearly every bridge in the county was rebuilt on heavier designs.

They took the county through the transition from steam to gasoline propelled road machinery. When they took charge the county was equipped with several obsolete steam outfits. The county now has efficient up-to-date gasoline tractors and road building equipment.

We passed through the period when wages and materials doubled and tripled.

The State and School taxes illustrate the advance in expenses. When the present court went into office the state tax was \$24,000, it is now \$74,000—the school was \$25,000, now, \$57,000.

By skillful diplomacy they have secured very beneficial co-operative contracts with the State and Forest Service. Viz: The Alsea road, the coast road connecting Tillamook and Lincoln county and the state highway from Newport to Corvallis.

Their acts have been characterized by vigilance, efficiency, courtesy and honesty.

IN MEMORY

Miss Rebecca Mariah Layton was born in Albany, Oregon, July 22nd, 1857 and died at her home in Independence, Oregon, December 19th, at 5 p. m., 1920, aged 62 years, 11 months and nine days.

She was married to Charles Dick, October 8th, 1876, at Albany, Oregon. To this union two children were born, Mrs. Eva Dunn of Toledo, Or., and Mrs. Maggie Groves of Independence, Or. Besides raising her two children, she was also the foster mother of Clyde Dick who was drowned at Oak Point, Washington, March, 17, 1917. Mrs. Dick peacefully passed away at her home in Independence, Or., at 5 o'clock, p. m., December 19th, 1920, after only one week's illness from bronchial pneumonia.

She was from early girlhood a member of the Church and a consistent Christian up to the time of her death. She leaves to mourn her loss, her husband and two daughters, three grand children and a large circle of friends and neighbors. She was a member of the W. R. C. at Toledo, years ago and took an active part in its work. Mrs. Dick was highly esteemed by all who knew her. It can be said of her that she lived at her best in her own home and there she will be missed most. She was a good neighbor, indulgent mother and faithful wife. She came with her husband to Yaquina Bay in 1876 and took up a homestead on De-Poe slough joining the Rader homestead. The same year Mr. Wade and family, Mr. Harmon and family, Mr. Rader and family and Mr. Kyniston and family and F. M. Stanton took up homesteads in the same community where they lived as neighbors for a good many years. Mr. Dick is the only living man who helped to hew the logs that were used in building the Stanton school house. Mrs. F. M. Stanton died of the cooking of the meals while the men who were working on the house. The early pioneers who came to Yaquina Bay 50 years ago have nearly all passed over the long, long trail to that bourn from whence no traveler has ever returned. In the trials, troubles and privations incident to a new country Mrs. Dick bore her part. She helped to make trails, cut the brush to get a place big enough to build a home in this wilderness where the Indian and wild animal roamed at large. The small group of pioneers still left may through hope and love hear the rustle of wings and see the star that is to guide them to the Eternal City. Till then, farewell.

For the organization of the Lincoln County Drainage District No. 3 in the County Court of the State of Oregon for Lincoln County

To the Honorable County Court of the State of Oregon for Lincoln County

Come now your petitioners who represent to you that they are the owners of fifty per cent of the acreage in a contiguous body of swamp, wet and overflowed land situate in Lincoln County, Oregon, and herewith present to you their petition that they may form a drainage district pursuant to the provisions of Chapter XI, Olson's Oregon Laws, for the purpose of having such land reclaimed and protected by drainage, or otherwise, from effects of water for agricultural purposes the same being conducive to the public convenience and welfare, and of such public utility and benefit, and for such purposes the owners have prepared and signed this petition in which they respectfully state:

5. That the proposed reclamation or protection is for agricultural purposes and that such proposed reclamation will be conducive to the public benefit.

6. That all of the lands included in said proposed district are properly included therein and will be beneficially affected by the operation of the proposed district.

7. That the benefits of such proposed reclamation will exceed the damage to be done, and that the best interests of the land included, and of the owners of such land as a whole, and of the public at large, will be promoted by the formation and proposed operations of such district.

8. That the formation of a drainage district under the provisions of this act is a proper and advantageous method of accomplishing the reclamation and protection of the lands included therein.

9. That the following is a brief, general, informal statement of a proposed plan of reclamation and protection and such general facts as will enable the court to determine that there is a reasonable probability that the objects sought by the formation of the district may be accomplished, to-wit, that

It is planned to drain and reclaim the lands in the said district by the completion, repair and maintenance of the dam, tide gates and dike across the tidal outlet or slough known as Beaver Creek, about one mile north-west of the City of Toledo. The detail plan of said improvement will be such as may be adopted by the Board of Supervisors, upon the advice and direction of the engineers for the said district.

11. That the signers hereto agree to pay any and all expense incurred and any tax or taxes that may be levied against their lands for the purpose of paying the expense of organizing, or attempting to organize, the proposed district.

WHEREFORE, your petitioners pray for an order of the above entitled court that the lands herein described, or so much of them as may be found by the court to be properly included in said district, either permanently or until further investigation and survey may permit elimination, shall be organized into a drainage district.
