## Babies in Arms in Polish Bread Line



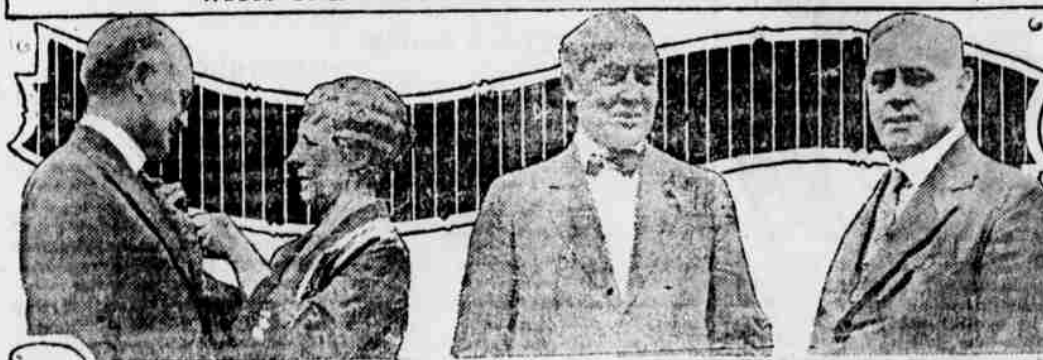
Children, too weak to walk, are carried in their mothers' arms to the American Jewish Relief clinics in Poland. The faces of mothers and children alike are lined deep with suffering, privation and disease brought on by five years of starvation.

This photograph, typical of 3,500,000 child victims of war and famine, slowly dying in Eastern and Central Europe, was taken at Lodz. Food is the only cure that most of them need. Without it they must perish. America is the only land to which they can look for the faintest hope of life. No food can be had from their own countries sooner than the harvests of 1921. Starvation is daily taking toll by the hundreds. Every dollar to be given to the European Relief Council's \$33,000,000 fund, now being raised, must be given immediately. Starvation knows no delay.

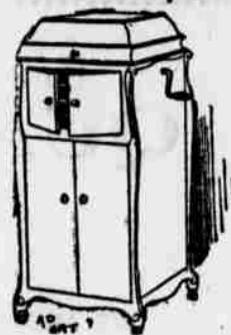
