TO LINCOLN COUNTY ROAD SUPERVISORS

Herewith is a resolution passed by the County Court at the February term, 1921. You will be governed accordingly.

In the County Court of the State of Oregon for Lincoln County.

RESOLUTION
WHEREAS, the funds for Lincoln County, Oregon, for road work are depleted; and

WHEREAS, it is the intention of the County Court to have none but emergency work performed on the roads during the year 1921; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, By the County Court of Lincoln County, Oregon, in regular session, that the different road supervisors throughout the county be and they are hereby instructed to do no work on the roads, or cause any work to be done, unless the same is duly and regularly ordered by the Court, except in the case of an emergency; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the said road supervisors be, and they are hereby notified that the county will not be responsible for the payment of any work done on the roads or highways unless the same has been ordered by the County Court, or is in the nature of emergency work.

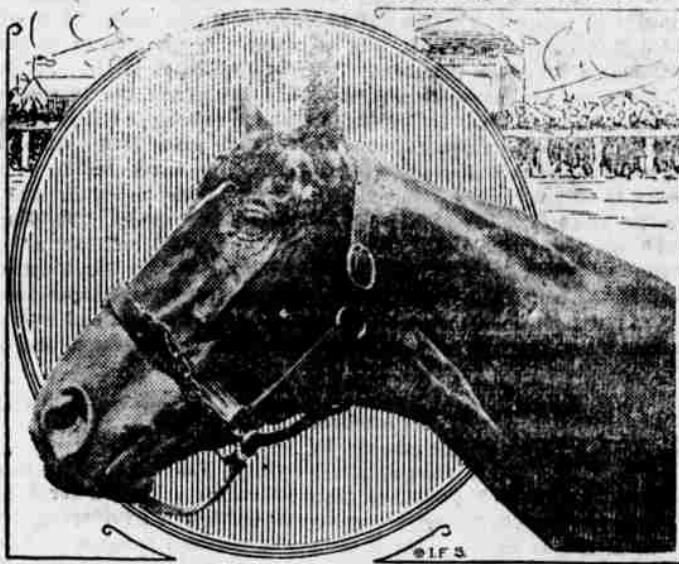

PLANT PLenty OF VITAMINE VEGETABLES



Science has contributed a new food fact, asserting that a new element called vitamins has been found highly important to wholesome food. Vitamins are comprised of fat soluble A, and water soluble B and C, and are entirely distinct from the old balance of carbohydrates, fats and proteins. Vitamins grow in all thin leaf vegetables and most citrus fruits. Also in apples, milk and eggs. So plant plenty of tomatoes, spinach and carrots, cabbage, lettuce and turnips in your garden this year. They all contain vitamins.

GREATEST HORSE NOW MUNCHES BLUEGRASS



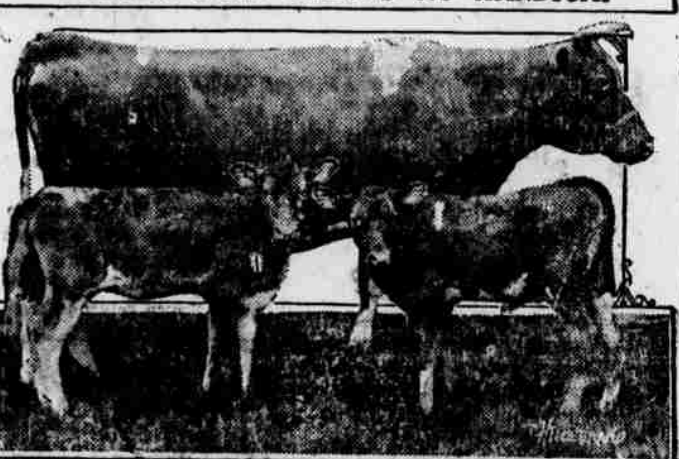
Man o' War, the greatest horse ever bred, has stepped his last mile in competition. The other day at Lexington (Ky.) track, before thousands of admiring eyes, he plowed his way through mud in long easy strides, his last exhibition. Now his owner, S. N. Riddle of Philadelphia, has retired him for breeding purposes on a Kentucky stock farm. Man o' War, in beating the 1920 champion, Sir Barton, by more than seven lengths in a matched race at Windsor last fall, set a record for winning never attained by a horse before—nearly a quarter million dollars. His record of 1:35.3-5 for the mile was made when "held up" for a sixteenth of the way by his jockey. He has never yet been "let out."

PEARL'S TWIN CALVES NO HANDICAP



Having twin calves didn't stop this industrious cow from going out after a milk and butter fat record. And she got it. Her name is Pearl of Pomeroy, and she is owned by D. D. Tenney of Crystal Bay, Minn. This makes her third advanced register record at 5 years old, 11,798.9 pounds of milk and 58,367 pounds of butter fat, carried by twin calves, shown here, 275 days of that time. She is a
