CHARGES NOT REFUTED

As usual radical labor agitators are seeking to befog the public mind as to the present problem relative to national agreements and working conditions imposed upon the railroads which reduce efficiency and increase cost of operation.

The railroads ask that these relics of wartime control be set aside in favor of new agreements between the roads and their employees.

There is no suggestion of abrogation of the principle of recognition of unions or of the practice of collective bargaining. The question is whether the national agreements unduly enhance the cost of railroad operation, which the public in the end pays. High railroad rates contribute much to the present industrial depression and have gone far to paralyze the lumber industry, which employs more than half the workmen in the Pacific Northwest. The first step to bring down rates must be increased economy in railroad operation. The national agreements have been declared an obstacle to economy; it is up to their defenders to prove that they are not.

Railroad executives do not so much complain about wages as about working conditions. They charge that the agreements forced on them since December 31, 1917, cause great waste and great inefficiency and that the cost of operation is thus much increased. They make these specific declarations:

That the number of shop men has been increased since December 31, 1917, from 302,828 to 443,774, or 47 per cent, and their total wages from \$317,879,549 to about \$890,000,000, or 180 per cent.

That the number of clerks has been increased from 184,663 to 238,693, or 29 per cent, and their wages from \$180,000,000 to \$359,300,000, or 112 per cent.

That the number of maintenance of way employees has been increased from 350,000 to 376,000 and their wages from \$220,000,000 to \$476,000,000, or 112 per cent.

That "this increase in the number of employees was due to rules and working conditions which destroyed the efficiency of labor, reduced the output per man and rendered it necessary to employ a much larger number of men." The increase in aggregate wages was due largely to this cause, not alone to increase in rates of wages.

The railroad unions have not refuted a single one of these charges. In the meantime industry and the public pays the bill.—Oregon Manufacturer.

Doctors have tried starving the patient and holding a dish of fresh milk at their mouth hoping to lure them out. I saw one poor woman starve to death in Kansas, because the worm took all the nourishment she ate and there seemed to be no remedy. I afterwards saw a man on the streets of Hutchinson selling bottles of medicine he claimed would get them sure and for evidence he had many jars and bottles with tape worms in them. He had a jar with one he said he took from a well known citizen there that measured 85 feet long which he charged him \$25 for and had got it at ten o'clock that morning. It is no disgrace to have a tape worm and no disgrace to keep them when there is no known remedy to destroy them. They are not contagious only as they are eaten in meat. They are found in beef and pork. To get them eat nothing but good ripe prunes, for supper good ripe prunes for breakfast and when hungry eat prunes. Be sure not to put sugar on them and eat nothing but prunes. The old fellow down there wont like that, but that is what you like, and if he don't let him move out. He can't stand the acid and it wont hurt you, and before night he will let go, head and eyes. Then eat light for a few days, better eat four or five times a day than to eat one big meal.

Sale of Indian Lands

The following list of Indian lands under existing laws. SEALED BIDS for the same will be opened at 2 o'clock P. M. on May 3, 1921, when the bids will be opened and considered. All bids shall be enclosed in a sealed envelope, which must be conspicuously marked "BID FOR INDIAN LANDS." The DATE of the proposed sale must also be placed thereon, but nothing else. No bidder will be permitted to include more than one allotment in any one bid. Should a prospective purchaser desire to purchase more than one allotment he should submit a separate bid for each, and if he desires to purchase less than an entire allotment, he may submit a bid for one or more legal subdivisions thereof and such bid will be considered in connection with the appraised value of each such legal subdivision. No bid for less than the appraised value will be considered. The right to reject any or all bids is reserved by the Commissioner of Indian Affairs.

Each bid must be accompanied by a duly certified check, certificate of deposit or cashier's check on some solvent bank, payable to the order of Edwin L. Chalcraft, Superintendent, for ten per cent (10%) of each bid, as a guarantee for the faithful performance by the bidder of his proposals. Cash in lieu of check will not be accepted and will cause bid to be rejected. If the bid shall be accepted, and the bidder shall within thirty days after due notice of the acceptance of his bid fail to comply with the terms of his bid by making final payment, the money represented by such check shall be forfeited to the use of the owner of the land. The checks of all unsuccessful bidders will be returned to them within ten days after the opening of bids.

The successful bidder when his bid is accepted, will be called upon to pay the sum of \$20, in addition to his bid for the land; and also his portion of the expense for advertising the land. The receipt of a bid will be considered evidence that the bidder accepts this requirement. The cost for advertising will be kept to the minimum.

The patent issued to purchasers will contain a provision to the effect that there is reserved from the lands granted a right of way for ditches and canals constructed under authority of the United States.

Deferred payments at six per cent interest, on sales exceeding \$1000, can generally be arranged, provided a payment of not less than twenty-five per cent of the purchase price is made when the bid is accepted. The bidder should mention the allotment number, name of allottee, give the description of the land covered by his bid, and the character of payments intended.
