THE HOME MEDICINE CHEST
(G. S. Parmele)

The medicine chest should be one of the most carefully kept places in the home. Carelessness in the keeping or using of medicines, drugs or disinfectants denotes ignorance. It should be a cupboard out of the reach of children, if possible kept locked. Left over bits of medicines which have been given on a physician's prescription should not be allowed to accumulate. Disinfectants to be used externally should be kept in a different part of the cupboard from those for internal use. All should be labeled and poison should be plainly marked. It is well to have on poisons a special cap held on by a rubber band, then if the bottle is picked up hurriedly, one is reminded by having to remove the cap; or pins drove crosswise through the cork—the pins will be a reminder that poison is being handled. All to often we hear of accidents such as Iyol being given for cough syrup, oxalic crystals used for boric acid or opium salts, iodine for cascara, as in a case here when Mrs. Knoble gave her son, a short time ago, iodine, fortunately they had plenty of cream and milk so it did not hurt him much. Mrs. Walton on Salmon River a short while ago was not very well and a kind neighbor gave her four little pills to take. She supposed she was to take them all at once. The result was it nearly killed her. She was alone in her home with her 2½ year old daughter. A few days later a woman went there to have a chat with her and found her and the baby girl in bed and had had nothing to eat for two days. Directions on medicine should be carefully read twice.

SILETZ SCHOOL

"May we borrow the key to the big gate?" This was the question of some small boys at school as they came to the High School room. They were so interested in preparing their part of the school garden that they were hauling fertilizer to put the seed bed into the best condition possible. Sale of Indian Lands

The following list of Indian lands located on the Siletz Indian Reservation and in Southern Oregon are offered for sale under existing laws. SEALED BIDS for the same will be received until 2 o'clock P. M. on May 3, 1921, when the bids will be opened for consideration. All bids shall be enclosed in a sealed envelope, which must be conspicuously marked "BID FOR INDIAN LANDS." The DATE of the proposed sale must also be placed thereon, but nothing else. No bidder will be permitted to include more than one allotment in any one bid. Should a prospective purchaser desire to purchase more than one allotment he should submit a separate bid for each, and if he desires to purchase less than an entire allotment, he may submit a bid for one or more legal subdivisions thereof and such bid will be considered in connection with the appraised value of each such legal subdivision. No bid for less than the appraised value will be considered. The right to reject any or all bids is reserved by the Commissioner of Indian Affairs.

Each bid must be accompanied by a duly certified check, certificate of deposit or cashier's check on some solvent bank, payable to the order of Edwin L. Chalcraft, Superintendent, for ten per cent (10%) of each bid, as a guarantee for the faithful performance by the bidder of his proposals. Cash in lieu of check will not be accepted and will cause bid to be rejected. If the bid shall be accepted, and the bidder shall within thirty days after due notice of the acceptance of his bid fail to comply with the terms of his bid by making final payment, the money represented by such check shall be forfeited to the use of the owner of the land. The checks of all unsuccessful bidders will be returned to them within ten days after the opening of bids.

The successful bidder when his bid is accepted, will be called upon to pay the sum of \$20, in addition to his bid for the land; and also his portion of the expense for advertising the land. The receipt of a bid will be considered evidence that the bidder accepts this requirement. The cost for advertising will be kept to the minimum.

The patent issued to purchasers will contain a provision to the effect that there is reserved from the lands granted a right of way for ditches and canals constructed under authority of the United States.

Deferred payments at six per cent interest, on sales exceeding \$1000, can generally be arranged, provided a payment of not less than twenty-five per cent of the purchase price is made when the bid is accepted. The bidder should mention the allotment number, name of allottee, give the description of the land covered by his bid, and the character of payments intended.
