ALBANY CREAMERY IS RAZED BY FIRE

The creamery of the Albany Creamery Association, which was one of the largest and best equipped plants of the kind in the Willamette valley and which was the largest co-operative creamery in Oregon, was destroyed by fire Sunday morning. With the loss on some of the equipment and supplies not fully determined, it was estimated that the total loss would reach \$25,000 and might exceed that figure. Insurance of \$9000 was carried.

It is practically certain that the plant will be rebuilt as soon as possible.

BOSS GETS BAIT, HOOK AND ALL BUT REEL

Elk City Cow Factor in Latest of Fish Stories

Elk City, Or., May 3.—(Special.)—When Chester Dixon, merchant of Elk City, saw a fish reel and line hanging from the mouth of his milk cow he wondered if his favorite bovine had contracted the fishing fever which invades the village every April, or if in a spirit of mischievousness she had caught, by swallowing his tackle, to circumvent his Waltonian proclivities. Inadvertently, the outfit had been left on the lawn, where the cow was used as a lawn mower, and the animal, it seems, did not notice what she had licked up with the grass until the fishing reel refused to give up any more line and began traveling nearer the cow's nose at each succeeding swallow.

EFFORT TO REDUCE TELEPHONE RATES

President W. K. Taylor of the Benton County Farm Bureau News, recently called a meeting of Benton, Lane, Linn and Lincoln counties, with a view of forming an association for the purpose of employing a rate expert or traffic attorney to gather data to present to the Public Service Commission at the time of the rehearing of the telephone rate case. P. Frederick, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, and D. L. Peterson, president of Lincoln County Farm Bureau, attended the meeting.

Definite action was taken by the delegates, the decision being made to raise approximately \$4,000 with which to carry on the work. The delegates present were instructed to recommend to their county contingencies that each phone user be requested to donate one dollar to the cause, and if after the work has been carried to its conclusion there is any money left in the treasury, the same shall be prorated back to the county or unit from which it came. Mr. Peterson has written a special communication to the president or secretary of all farmers' lines of the county, asking the officers of these associations to take the matter up with their patrons. Mr. Frederick is calling the matter to the attention of the city phone users. The Lincoln County committee suggests that all those interested send their dollar donations as soon as possible in order that a report from the county can be made by May 15th if possible. The money should be handed or sent to the executives of the local lines, or to P. Frederick, secretary, Toledo Chamber of Commerce.

OLD SOLDIERS AND THEIR WIDOWS TAX EXEMPTIONS

Ed Stocker, the assessor, informs us that under a law passed by the recent session of the Oregon Legislature an honorably discharged union soldier or sailor of the Mexican war, the war of the rebellion or the Indian wars of the State of Oregon, or the widows remaining unmarried, of such soldiers or sailors, are entitled to an exemption from taxation to the amount of \$1000.

Those seeking to take advantage of this law are required to file with the assessor a statement under oath that he or she is the owner of the real property on which they claim exemption. It is made the duty of those claiming such exemption from taxation on other property than their homestead to give notice to the assessor or the county court designating the property on which such exemption is claimed.

Those seeking to take advantage of this exemption are requested to file their claims for same as soon as convenient.

CALLS CROWD, KILLS SELF

Wag Leaves Recipe For Making "Jackass Brandy"

San Francisco, April 25.—An unidentified man who shot and killed himself yesterday on a lumber pile after calling a small crowd to witness his death, left a recipe for "jackass brandy" which the coroner's office made public today.

The recipe contains the following items:
"Seven spoons of barbed wire, ten pounds of chewing tobacco, one sack of tulle roots, one can of blasting powder, five gallons of river water. Mix all together and cool for nine days and nights. Set on ice and cool while you dig your grave. Then take one drink and go for the hole. You will need no covering. The jackass will cremate you."
