We produce annually ten million pounds. Its quality is recognized throughout the entire country, yet our per capita consumption is only one-tenth of what it should be.

I hereby designate the week from June 19 to June 26 inclusive, as Cheese Consumption Week throughout this state.

I request the full co-operation of the people of this state, in a movement that will encourage one of our best industries and lead to a more extended use of one of our best foods.

I urge that every home in Oregon take advantage of the opportunity which is presented by the dairy industry of this state, to become well supplied with this food. I ask for the co-operation of groceries and retail merchants, that this product might be sold on a fair margin of profit and that hotels and restaurants and all public eating places serve liberal portions at a price that will stimulate consumption.

I also bespeak the co-operation of the press which is always freely given in the furtherance of every proper and beneficial movement.

LEE WADE PASSES BEYOND

He has been an untiring worker for the upbuilding and development of this section, and had great faith in the future of the Yaquina Bay country. He spared neither time nor money to aid in its advancement. He is also survived by three brothers, Ed and Ira of this city, and Dye of Portland, also two grandchildren. He served as Deputy County Clerk for ten years, and has been a member and secretary of the Port Commission of the Port of Toledo since its organization in 1910. He died at Albany, June 15th, 1921, death being caused by Cerebral Hemorrhage. He was 56 years of age. Funeral services will be held this afternoon, with interment in the Toledo Cemetery.
