SILETZ

The revival meetings that have been going on for two weeks, and he'd at the M. E. church, conducted by the noted evangelist Robert Breymen and the pastor, Rev. Walter Ross, closed Sunday evening. We have plenty of room.

IN MEMORY

(By F. M. Carter)

Lee Wade was born in Logan County Illinois, April 14th, 1866, and died at Albany, Oregon, June 16th, 1921, aged 55 years, 2 months and 1 day. He came to what is now Lincoln County in August, 1876, a mere boy, and has lived here ever since that time. He grew to manhood in the county and became a part of it. He was as well known, perhaps, as any man in the county. He helped to open up and make the county what it is today. He had faith in Lincoln County. He knew of her vast resources in timber, in dairy products, her fruit, her fisheries, and her splendid harbor and seaside resort, and has always helped to develop them. He was progressive and had a personality of his own. His honor was never questioned. When Lee Wade said any thing, it was believed. How much better the county would be if we had more of his kind. No one thought he was so dangerously ill. He kept working up to a few days before he was taken to the hospital. I don't believe he thought the end was so near, he was always planning all the time for the future.

Lee Wade was engaged in the sawmill business and expected to continue that business right along. He owned a large tract of timber nearby that he expected to saw up. He had bought a nice five acre tract of land and had under way and nearly completed a fine bungalow, which when finished will be one of the finest homes in the county.

Lee Wade was well acquainted with the county and especially with the vast body of fine timber that stands untouched in the northern part of the county, and the two townships that stand in the southern part. He had helped cruise a large part of this timber in the north end and had acted as fire warden to keep the fires from destroying it. For years he was the trusted leader in locating claims and homesteads. He was employed by corporations and timber men to do their work, and he never betrayed a trust or proved untrue. He was progressive and gave freely of his time and money to help develop the resources of the county. He was also a booster for good roads and harbor improvements. He served for ten years as Deputy County Clerk and was a member and secretary of the Port of Toledo since its organization in 1910. He had a host of friends in and out of the county who mourn his untimely death. It was sad indeed to see his body laid in state, so many friends move up and take a last sad look of the familiar features of Lee Wade as he lay quietly at rest from the cares and troubles incident to human life.

Among the number that viewed the remains were five Indian women, who sadly viewed the remains of one whom they had always esteemed as a friend. These women said Lee Wade had never deceived or mistreated the Indian people.

The casket was literally covered with beautiful floral offerings from friends at Albany, Newport, Siletz and the home town.

In the social and business affairs of the county Lee Wade will be missed. He is survived by his wife and four children, Mrs. Lola Cruson, Frank, Carrie and Arthur, Toledo, and three brothers, Ed and Ira, of Toledo, and Dye of Portland. He was kind to his family, generous to a fault, a good neighbor, a big hearted, wholesouled citizen.

The funeral services were held at the Bateman Undertaking Parlors, conducted by Rev. Walter Ross, which were singularly beautiful and appropriate. Two selections were sung by Miss Verne Ross, Mrs. Rosa McElwain and Jess Daniel; "Rock of Ages Lamb of God," and "Just as I am, Oh Lamb of God, I Come, I Come."

Interment took place in the family plot in the Toledo cemetery. Pall bearers were: James Franks, Grant King, Ted McElwain, Walter Ball, Fred Stanton and Al Waugh. The funeral was largely attended by friends and neighbors. Request in peace.

Two cents will be charged for each target, and the balance of the entrance fee will be added to the \$7.00 as above. The purse in each event will be divided, 40, 30, 20, and 10%, according to the rules of trap shooting.

The shooting grounds will be on the bluff overlooking the ocean just back of "Armadillo", which will give a sky line and ocean background to shoot against. W. G. Emery, of Newport, will have charge of the tournament. Professional shooters from the outside will attend the meet, and will give an expert exhibition with shotgun and rifle.
