SILETZ

Simpson Billie, one of the oldest Indians on the Reservation, died at his home near here July 19th, 1921, aged 85 years. He was a sub-chief of the Mac-noutany tribe of Indians. He was selected as the leader of the big feather dances during the Fourth of July celebration at Newport. He considered it a great honor to be selected to lead his people in celebrating our national holiday dressed in the ancient costume of his people. He said to a number of his friends that this would be the last dance he would engage in on earth, but he hoped to meet his friends in the "Happy Hunting Ground" where the pleasure he enjoyed here would go on forever. The next dance that he would lead will be in that far away country where there would be no more sorrow nor dying nor sickness, pain nor death. No doubt his dream will be realized at least he believed it would be. In his effort to make the dance a success, he contracted a very bad cold and a bad cough that finally caused his death. He was a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church and was greatly interested in the Bible story of the creation of man and the giving of the law to Moses. He said Moses went upon a high mountain to talk with the Great Spirit and get the law. That is just the same with the Medicine Men or Prophets. He goes upon a high mountain and talks to the Great Spirit and gets the law the very same as Moses did and the people believe him when he tells them how he got the law. The ancient Jewish people were much like the Indians in their habits, customs and mode of living. Simpson Billie was honest and truthful and never had any trouble with the agent or anyone else. He was never put in the guard house during his 64 years he lived as a ward of the Government. The funeral was attended by a large part of the community. Rev. Walter Ross conducted the services and the interment took place in the beautiful cemetery hill overlooking the peaceful Siletz Valley.

The cheese factory is running regular every day in the week excepting Sunday, putting a fine quality of cheese on the market. The farmers are nearly all patronizing the factory and the quantity of milk increases right along. The milk is of good quality and the daily amount received is from 25 to 26 hundred pounds. The daily output of cheese is about 260 pounds. This industry if kept going will bring Siletz to the front as a dairy country. The feed is excellent this year and the oats and other kind of hay crops are being put up in fine condition. Some of the farmers will have hay to sell this year.

The Logan berries that were put out a year ago are looking fine. The Kearn and Williams field of fifteen acres of Logan berries are making a splendid growth.

The auto travel to Siletz is increasing every day. The roads are in good condition and the fishing in Siletz river and its tributaries is good. We have a good many tourist cars coming to Siletz and a good many people are looking for land to make permanent homes.

W. H. Daniels, of Colville, Washington, is now on a visit with his son, Jesse, and will remain for several days he is pleased with this country. This country is what the people will make it. Nature has made it one of the best coast counties and the enterprise and push of the people will do the rest.

James, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jaa. Willis of Dallas Oregon, was born May 16, 1908 at West Yaquina, Lincoln County, Oregon. It was at this place that he began his education in the public school attending for four years. When the family removed to Dallas he entered the schools there, attending for two and a half years. On September 1st, 1918 he became a member of the Methodist Sunday School in Dallas, and later united with the Church. He was ever a loving son and brother, truthful and obedient at all times.

A few weeks ago while picking cherries the limb on which he was standing gave way and he fell a distance of about 15 feet sustaining a compound fracture of his left arm. A few days ago he was stricken with lock-jaw and on Friday night, July 15, at 12 o'clock, the Heavenly Father, who knoweth what is best, called him Home.

He leaves to mourn his loss a loving father and mother, two brothers, six sisters and other relatives and friends. He was 13 years, 2 months, old at his death. Funeral services were held in the Methodist Church of Dallas, Monday the 18th, Rev. Frank James, pastor, officiating. Interment was in the Odd Fellows Cemetery.
