**FIRE MARSHAL'S REPORT**

August 26th, 1921.

**Introduction**  
Toledo, the County seat of Lincoln County, Oregon, has a population of about 700. Lumbering and dairying are the principal industries of the community. During the recent war with Germany, the U. S. Government built a large spruce mill at this location. The mill has never been in operation but it is understood that it is expected to start operating in the near future.

The city is located in a valley surrounded by high wooded hills. The mills are located in the flats, and the residential and business district is located on the side of a steep hill. Hill street, which is the main business thoroughfare is paved with concrete. A few of the cross streets are timbered but many of the streets are of dirt and due to their steepness are impassible in bad weather.

**Water Supply**  
Toledo has two water systems; a high pressure system which has been in for some time, and a low pressure system recently installed with Army labor.

The high pressure system derives its source from Mill Creek the intake of which is seven miles South of town and 300 ft. above the depot. The water is carried through two miles of 7-inch pipe and five miles of 6-inch pipe to a concrete reservoir located above town. The primary reservoir is 215 ft. above the depot and has, according to local authority, a capacity of 400,000 gallons. A secondary concrete reservoir has a capacity of 500,000 gallons and handles the overflow from the primary reservoir. Distribution is by 6 and 4 inch mains about town. There are 22 two-way fire hydrants on this system. On Hill street the normal static pressure is about 80 pounds per square inch. Due to the great difference in elevation, this pressure is materially less in the residential section.

The low pressure system has an intake on Mill Creek four miles out of town. It is carried by gravity through a 12-inch pipe at practically water level to the spruce mill. At the entrance to the City a 6-inch connection is made which is continued direct through the business district. On this low pressure system there are three risers with 2 1/2 inch fire hose connections.

**Fire Department**

At the present time the Fire Department has neither organization nor acting chief.

The Fire Department equipment consists of three hand drawn reels located about town at points of vantage, each reel having 500 feet of new double jacket fire hose. At the City Hall where one reel is located, there is also a single tank 40 gallon chemical cart and a village hook and ladder truck.

Alarm is by a bell erected on a tower on top of the City Hall.

**Existing Ordinances**

So far as could be determined, the City of Toledo has only one Ordinance effecting the fire hazard. Ordinance No. 134 passed by the Common Council on June 7, 1915 limits the quantity of gasoline not buried to ten gallons.

**General Conditions**

In general, housekeeping conditions in the business district were found to be better than the average town of this size.

The electrical wiring in many buildings was found to be of inferior quality. Buildings were found having no cutout switch on the main. Others had neither cutout switch nor fuse plugs. In some cases the cutout switch and fuse plugs were located in the attic where they were hard to get at.

One block of the business district is composed entirely of old frame buildings of inferior construction. A fire starting in this block would be hard to control. For that reason every precaution should be taken to prevent the start of a fire.

There was an obvious lack of city Ordinances controlling the fire hazards. It is considered essential that the City Council pass such ordinances as are necessary to control the special hazards.

**Recommendations**

It is recommended:  
(1) That the city of Toledo be forwarded copies of the following ordinances with strong recommendations for their immediate adoption.  
"Construction of Chimneys and Flues."  
"Regulating Electric Wiring."  
"Cleanliness of Streets and Alleys."  
"Regulating Burning of Refuse."  
"Regulating Storage of Explosives."  
(2) That some competent man be appointed Chief of the Fire Department and given instructions to organize a small volunteer company the members to receive some slight form of compensation.
