TAX RATIOS Newport, Ore., Oct. 18. Lincoln County Leader: I would like to use a little of your space to discuss the tax levy of 1921 in order to bring out some facts that may be useful in considering the equity of the present system in its relation to the next levy. As a basis for comparison am taking Benton Co. as we are more familiar with our neighbor than with others. In apportioning the state tax among the different counties in the ratio of the cash values of the property assessed the Tax Commission fix a ratio for each county giving in their judgment the ratio between the assessor's valuation and the cash value of property assessed. Lincoln's ratio is 90, Benton's 60 per cent. One ninth of Lincoln Co. total and two thirds of Benton's is added to the assessor's valuation to give the equalized valuation. The tax is then apportioned among the counties in the same proportion that their total valuation bears to the total equalized value of the whole state. I do not know how the county ratio is arrived at by the commission but wish to show in its application where it is unfair. The cities of Benton Co. appearing in 1920 census are Corvallis and Philomath with a population of 6343. In Lincoln Co. Newport and Toledo with population of 1258; a ratio of 5 to 1—Equalized value of town lots, Benton Co. \$2,758,860. Equalized value, town lots, Lincoln Co. \$719,000. Population ratio 5 to 1. Taxation ratio 4 to 1. Equalized value improvements on city lots, Benton Co. \$1,424,833. Valuation same, Lincoln Co. \$476,316. Population ratio 5 to 1. Assessed value 3 to 1. There are four residences in Newport whose asking price if for sale would exceed \$4000. There are not to exceed ten more whose asking price would exceed \$3000. Compare this with the number of high priced houses in Corvallis and notice the inequity. Looks like the tax ratios need adjustment. The writer has a letter from the State Tax Commissioner stating he considered our ratio of 90 too high and also stating that the Railroad Co. had examined the records in Lincoln Co. last year and that in the sales of lands the assessed values were only 55 per cent of the selling price. This would seem an intention to make our county ratio only 60. This would only increase our equalized assessment 50 per cent and add \$6 million dollars to the valuation. It would increase the state apportionment to Lincoln Co. on the basis of the 1920 assessment, roll some \$37,000—a mere trifle perhaps to the tax Commissioner but very vital to Lincoln Co. It looks as though our County Court and Assessor should be on hand at meeting of tax commission and see that we do not get something handed to us. Red Cross Gives \$310,000 to Aid 'Clean-Up' Drive An appropriation of \$310,000 for Red Cross work in connection with the "clean-up" campaign instituted by the Government to bring the claims of all disabled service men who are entitled to Federal aid before the proper government bureau for action, has been made by the American Red Cross. The Executive Committee of the American Red Cross in making the appropriation authorized the appropriation of \$35,000 of this sum to the American Legion to defray the expense of the Legion representatives assigned to the various districts of the Veterans Bureau. The remainder of the appropriation was authorized for apportionment among the several Divisions of the Red Cross for carrying on that part of the "clean-up" work that falls directly upon the Red Cross organization.

Young America Sends Vast Relief To Needy Abroad Various relief projects of the Junior American Red Cross in European countries resulted in helping 237,000 destitute children during the last fiscal year, according to the annual report of the American Red Cross for that period. The growth of the activities of the Juniors abroad is manifested by a comparison which shows this figure is 200,000 larger than that of the previous fiscal year. The National Children's Fund raised by school children, members of the Junior American Red Cross, was drawn upon for \$420,557 for these projects. Receipts for the National Children's Fund during the last fiscal year totaled \$155,317. America Succors Russians Food, clothing and medical relief costing \$700,000 has been provided by the American Red Cross for the thousands of Russian refugees stranded last year in Constantinople and vicinity.
