NOTICE OF FILING OF COMMISSIONERS' REPORT For Lincoln County Drainage Dis- trict No. 1

Notice is hereby given to all per-
sons interested in the land included
within the Lincoln County Drainage
District No. 1, Lincoln County, Ore-
gon, the boundary of said district be-
ing as follows:

Beginning at that certain point
which is the South quarter corner of
section 7, township 11 south, range
10 west of Willamette Meridian, in
Lincoln County, Oregon; thence west
450 rods, more or less, along the south
line of section 7 and section 12 to the
southwest corner of section 12, thence
north 160 rods to the north-
west corner of section 12; thence east
320 rods to the quarter section corner
between section 12 and section 7;
thence north 80 rods to a point 80
rods south of the northwest corner of
section 7; thence east 180 rods to the
line of section 7; thence north and south through
the center of section 7; thence north
160 rods more or less to a point 80
