Dear Sir:

This department acknowledges receipt of copy of the resolution adopted on the 19th instant by the City Council of Waldport, such resolution relating to the report on survey of your City, made by deputies representing this department.

For your information I may state that this department does not cause the publication of these survey reports in any case. We furnish copies of same to certain officials and in all cases to the City or County papers which may be interested in the matter. The publication of the report in its entirety or any part of it is left entirely to the editors of such papers.

We regret always that any statement appear in one of these reports which may be in any manner detrimental to the community interested, but like other official reports must give the facts as we find them. If errors are made in such reports we will always cheerfully correct them. I will therefore request that the officials of your city advise this office as to what features of the published report are incorrect. This will give an opportunity to investigate and determine whether or not our report should be changed.

Dear Sir:

In answer to your letter of October 24, we the City Council of Waldport, Oregon, respectfully submit the following findings and report, with respect to your report under date of September 1, 1921.

Your report as a whole is misleading, as it conveys the idea that the town is practically without fire protection, and that the fire risk is extremely great. The overdrawn impressions are plain, when we consider the fact that the entire business part of the town is located on a narrow peninsula only 800 feet across, with the Alsea Bay on two sides, and Lents Slough on the other side, besides water from the water system, which we realize is small compared with the systems of larger cities.

But, take into consideration the fact there are only two business houses with two stories, almost all the roofs can be reached without the aid of even a ladder, and being located on the sea coast where the climate is naturally moist.

The fire house instead of being an open shed, as we would understand from your report, is a frame building, made tight and kept under lock and key, so no one without authority could enter it without breaking in.

In regard to electric hazard, the greater part of the wiring here was done by a practical electrician, before the law came into effect, and has been examined and accepted as good by State Officers, the small systems here have been put in by licensed electricians, not by persons unfamiliar with wiring, as your report would lead one to believe.

As to business men believing insurance rates should be reduced due to the presence of the forty gallon chemical cart, we never have heard anyone take that stand, but, owing to the small exposure, natural protection and the protection supplied from other means, we believed insurance rates should have been reduced, and we were informed by an insurance rate adjuster was inspected the town shortly after your deputies, that he considered the insurance rate was too high, and we are informed that the

rates were cut down.

The fact that a few fires have started here, and have never destroyed only the buildings in which they originated, and in very few instances have even destroyed the buildings in which they originated is proof that we at least are able to handle fires in an intelligent manner.

The following are the statements embodied in your report that are false:

1. Your report states, the mayor stated there was no ordinance pertaining to fire prevention and protection. The city does have ordinances pertaining to fire protection, and the mayor so stated to your deputy.

2. Your report states, the entire fire apparatus consists only of a 40 gallon chemical, and a few 2½ gallon chemicals, which would exclude the fire ladders, pails, and fire axes that are stationed at several convenient places. Besides private parties have numerous fire protection devices.

3. Gasoline is not brought in in large quantities, neither is it stored on the dock in large quantities.

4. There is not a frame building on the dock as stated in your report in which powder is kept.

5. There is not a powder house of any kind on the dock as stated.

6. There is no powder house in the midst of gasoline drums, as stated in your report.

While it may have appeared to your deputy that there was a general slackness in regard to handling gasoline in the town, such is not the case. Practically all the gasoline sold in town, is sold from three street pumps, with tanks buried, and filled from the street.

At the regular meeting of the Council of the City of Waldport, Oregon, the recorder was instructed to make three copies of reply to State Fire Marshal, mail one to the Governor of Oregon, one copy to the State Fire Marshal, and have one copy printed in the Lincoln County Leader, together with a copy of the State Fire Marshal's communication of October 24, 1921.
