SILETZ

The holidays have passed and with them many pleasant memories. It had been a good many years since we had a white Christmas. It was a treat to coast on the hill sides and to ride over the frozen ground behind a team of spirited horses going eight or ten miles an hour. This was done at Siletz. Every one seemed to enjoy themselves as much in a sleigh as they would taking a joy ride in an auto and there is not near so much danger of an accident.

Siletz may be congratulated upon the splendid order and good cheer that prevailed during the weeks festivities.

The teachers have returned to their work after having spent the holidays at home with their families and friends. Prof. Deeg went as far as Seattle to spend Christmas with his family. Prof. Deegs family are teachers, his wife and two daughters are teaching in the State of Washington.

Siletz public School was never so well conducted as now. Order and discipline prevails in each department, on the play grounds as well as in the gymnasium. The gym is a great blessing as it keeps the children in the dry and thus prevents the children from getting colds and other acute diseases. When the children are dry and comfortable they can learn their lessons much better and it saves their shoes and clothing.

Rev. C. W. Pogue will hold revival meetings in the M. E. Church, commencing Sunday the 8th, and will continue for a week or more. Mr. Pogue is a good preacher and has much of the evangelistic spirit. In days gone by the Methodist Church at Siletz had more than a hundred members and it is hoped the church work will revive at this place again. Rev. John Adams the local minister will assist in the meetings. Mr. Adams is well known and has a high standing for his consistent christian character, not only among his own people but among the whites as well.

The road leading to the Lower Farm on the north side of the river is now open for travel. Wagons pass over it nearly every day. We long for the bridges and would like to see them put back but we will have to wait as the county is handicapped for the lack of funds. I understand the county court has two ways to raise this money, one is to issue county warrants, payable in one year and the other is to bond the county for the amount needed—about \$80,000. The bonds to run five or six years and commence the first year to pay them off. The people of Siletz favor the bond system as the best way to get the bridges built and the roads repaired. The bonds will bring ready money, where warrants may have to be discounted and may be they could not be paid at all, because many persons will not be able to pay their taxes and much of it will go on the delinquent list. Men who work for wages must be paid or they won't work.

Taxes keep mounting up and the tax payers are clamoring for more economy in the expenditures of the peoples money.

Eleanor Schildmeyer came up Saturday with the mail carrier after spending Christmas at home.

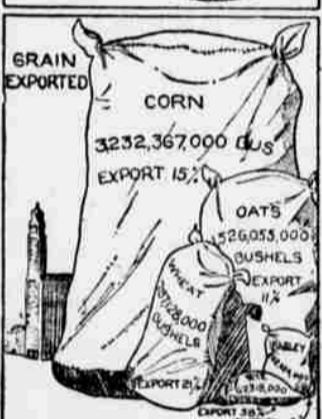
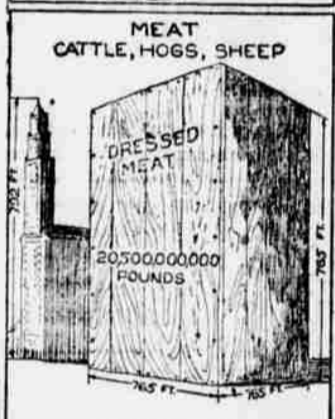
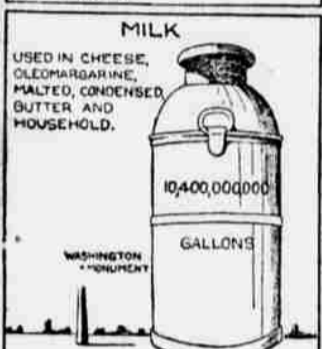
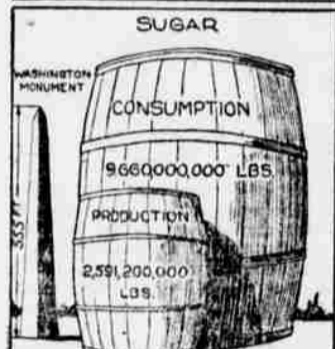
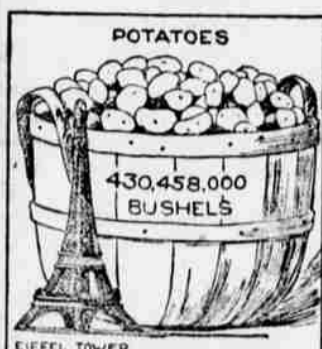
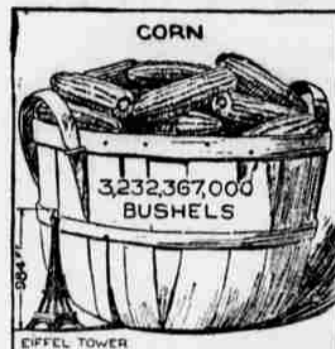

NEW DRYGOODS AND GENTS FURNISHINGS

O. E. Franke of Newport has rented the store building recently vacated by the Lincoln County Bank and will put in a complete line of dry goods, clothing, mens' furnishings, boots and shoes, etc.

E. L. Scott, who will be in charge of the store, was in the city yesterday. Mr. Scott stated that it would probably be the middle of February before the new store is open for business, as the building has to be remodeled and changed over for store purposes.

Mr. Franke has two stores now at Newport.

SHIPYARD FOR TOLEDO

The building of the rock barges for A. D. Kern is but the entering wedge in the shipbuilding industry on this bay, if plans now contemplated by O. R. Altree are carried out.

Mr. Altree, who is one of the best shipbuilders on the coast, (wood construction) is assembling a seven thousand dollar shipbuilding outfit at his yard in West Toledo. He has the most modern tools that are made for this work, some being brought here from the big Cornfoot Shipbuilding plant that was in operation at Portland during the war, and when he starts operations will employ from fifteen to twenty men steadily.

He now has a contract to build several barges for A. D. Kern, which will be used to transport rock for jetty construction. These barges will be 34 by 160 feet, with seven foot depth of hold.

Mr. Altree also has a contract to build a fishing schooner for California parties. The schooner will be 65 feet in length by 16 foot beam, seven foot depth of hold.

Mr. Altree will do some repair work for the Newport Transportation Company, and will repair other boats.

PACIFIC SPRUCE CO. REMODELING BIG MILL

President C. E. Johnson and son, and F. W. Stevens, general manager, of the Pacific Spruce Co., arrived down from Portland Wednesday evening to start active operations in the remodeling of the big government mill. They were accompanied by architect Swan and a number of millwrights.

They were out bright and early yesterday morning at the mill and a plan of campaign mapped out. The mill was built by the government for the exclusive manufacture of airplane spruce, and before it can be used for commercial purposes it is necessary that many changes be made. The front of the mill will be lengthened for the handling of longer logs, a part of the building put up by the government for a cut-up plant will be torn down. The big sorting shed will also be torn down and a number of other changes made.

The mill was but seventy per cent complete when the war ended, although the necessary material for completing same was all assembled and on the ground. The completion of the mill and the changes necessary will probably take five or six months time. The new company however expects to rush everything as fast as practical, and the mill will be in full operation not later than the first of June or July.

A number of local men were put to work this morning and will be employed steadily. The office building is being re-roofed and put in shape for occupancy.

Much work is also necessary on the railroad to Waldport before trains can be operated over same. This work and the logging will mean much to the metropolis of South Lincoln County, and a thriving little city will spring up at the mouth of the Alsea Bay.

The steamer Powers will be overhauled and put in shape to handle the towing of logs from South Beach to Toledo. We are informed that the company will also do some logging in the Wessel tract, north of Toledo.

WAR TAX REMOVED

Effective January 1st the war tax was removed from shoes, clothing, ice-cream, soft drinks, railroad tickets, and a long string of other articles. It is however still in effect on movie tickets, entertainments, dances, etc.
