

CIRCUIT COURT HAS
SHORT SESSION

Circuit Court convened Saturday morning with 114 cases on the docket, Judge J. W. Hamilton of Roseburg presiding.

The jury was not called until Monday, and but one jury trial was held—that of D. A. Reinhold vs. Mrs. J. W. Weidman, et al. This case involved the legality of a promissory note in the sum of \$1000 and which the defendant claimed she signed under duress. The jury brought in a verdict for the defendant. Plaintiff was given ten days in which to ask for a new trial.

The Grand Jury had no business placed before them whatever. They were held over until next term of Court.

Three women were drawn on the jury this year, two of which asked to be excused. Mrs. Alice T. Vader of Agate Beach, being the only one serving, and to her belongs the honor of being the first woman juror in Lincoln County.

AN OPEN LETTER

To Mrs. Bowers, Taft, Oregon
