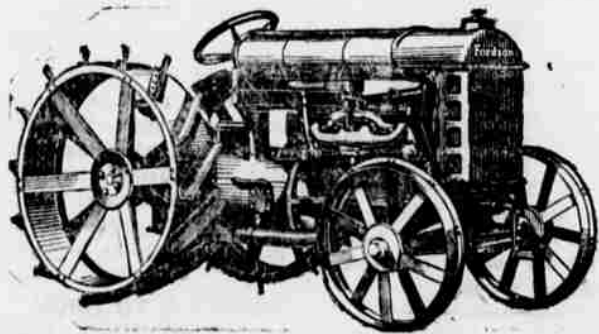

ADDITIONAL REASON

FRANCE FED UP

After a trial lasting fourteen years the French Government is going out of the railroad business. A specially appointed commission is at work on a plan to turn the roads back to private operation. Under government control the roads have been a steady drain on the national treasury. French experience has been practically a duplicate of that in the United States.

ENEMY OFFICER SAYS AMERICAN OFFICERS SAVED 1800 PRISONERS

Credit for saving the lives of 1800 Austro-Hungarian prisoners of war in a prison camp near Chabarovsk, in Eastern Siberia, during the Fall of 1918 is given to officers of the 27th United States Infantry by Lieut. Colonel Ferdinand Reber, of the Austro-Hungarian army, in an open letter. Colonel Reber's letter forwarded to the State Department by the American Mission at Budapest, says an epidemic of influenza had threatened to convert the camp into a vast cemetery, when the Americans took charge and converted the wretched hospital accommodations provided by the Russian authorities into a model establishment.

Colonel Reber declared "he felt it his first and sacred duty to let the world know that he and comrades owed their lives, health and happiness and power for good in the world to the noble American officers of the 27th regiment of the great American nation. Major Belt of this city was medical officer of the 27th during the occupancy of Chabarovsk in Eastern Siberia during the war.
