FUNDS FOR BRIDGES WILL BE ASKED

At the Primary election May 19th, there will also be held two special elections for the purpose of voting bonds for the building of bridges in Lincoln county. One bond issue will be to raise funds for the reconstruction of bridges destroyed by the flood of last November, and it is of vital importance to the development of the county that this measure should carry.

The other measure is to create funds for the bridging of the Yaquina river near Toledo and it is of no less vital importance to the growth and development of the county than the first measure. The large body of land lying between the Yaquina and Aisa rivers would be opened up to settlement, with the building of this bridge, and a direct means of communication between the north and south parts of the county established. It has been said that "A house divided against itself shall fall." Lincoln County is divided by the Yaquina river—the answer is obvious—let's bridge the river and unite the county. Once the bridge is built, enough new land will be settled and developed to pay for the improvement.

NORBLAD FOR CONGRESS WHY NOT A COAST MAN FOR THE COAST COUNTIES?

The Astorian is gratified that Hon. A. W. Norblad has accepted the appeal of his home community, so intimately acquainted with his strength, and the call from so many influential sources in the state and will become a candidate for congress from the first congressional district of Oregon, opposing for the nomination in the primaries on the republican ticket in May Congressman Willis P. Hawley. Mr. Norblad's career in the community where he has so long been prominent, and his larger activities in the public life of the state through his services as a member of the state senate, leave no question as to his eminent equipment for the responsibilities that a seat in the national house demand. Mr. Norblad is recognized as among the able men of Oregon and that standing has been achieved through service of a character where outstanding talent alone could succeed. His election would reflect credit upon Oregon and would give that further prestige to the west's voice in national councils that the situation so demands. Mr. Norblad will enter the race with the close interest of his legion of personal friends and the assured support of thousands who have been in touch with his public service.

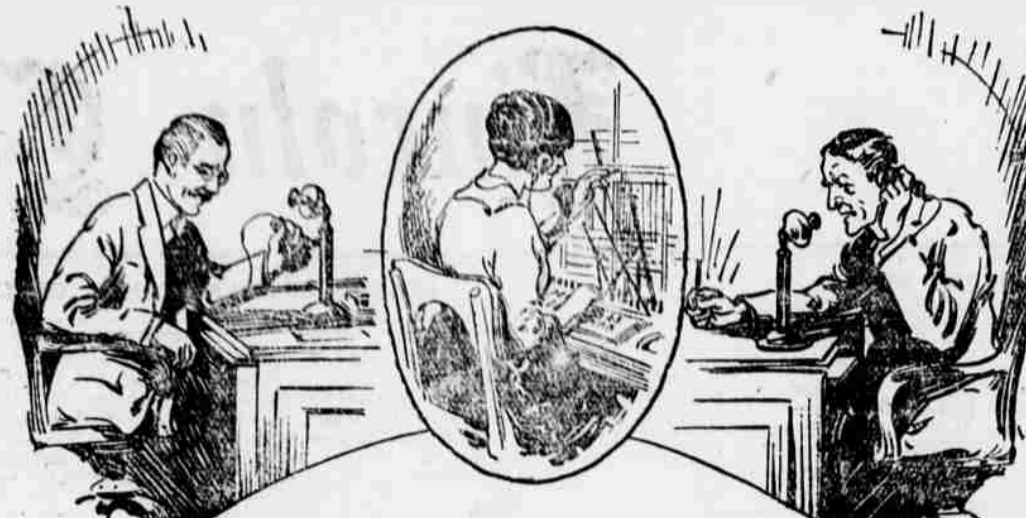
However, independent of the personal qualities involved in the candidacy of Mr. Norblad that so splendidly equip him for congressional duties, there are a number of situations that will appeal to the people of the entire state. The great region, embracing the coast counties of Oregon, are entitled to a seat at Washington. This region remains the isolated, undeveloped area of Oregon, with its problems of such a varied and peculiar nature that only a person intimately acquainted with, and having proper sympathies for, may properly present. Under present conditions this portion of the state is without such representation. The Willamette valley has as spokesmen both Senator McNary and Congressman Hawley, the immediate Portland district has its voice in Senator Stanfield, and Congressman McArthur while eastern Oregon is represented by Congressman Sizoo. Justice demands that this regional discrimination be no longer endured and a firm-minded attitude of the people will so concede when the campaign presents the magnitude and importance of the coast county problems that can be interpreted only by one of intimate acquaintance. It is so generally understood that Congressman Hawley has had no appreciation of the broader demands of his service from a state standpoint that further discussion along that line at this time is unnecessary. A service of fifteen years in congress has found him at the close of that period without prestige, power or initiative, whereas the call of the times—the pressing demand of ever changing, forward-looking conditions—is for men of vision and action. Mr. Hawley affords, in fact, the conspicuous exhibit that congress needs new blood. To elect a man of Mr. Norblad's stamp to succeed him will provide a national service, aside from enhancing the immediate prestige of Oregon as a state, and the Astorian feels confident in its prediction that the people of the district are to take that step—Morning Astorian, April 9, 1922—Adv.
