200,000 TOURISTS TO TRAVERSE OREGON IN 1922, IS PREDICTION

Fifty thousand automobiles carry-
ing at least 200,000 visitors, will enter
Oregon this year, it is estimated by
Herbert Cuthbert, executive secretary
of the Pacific Northwest Tourist as-
sociation, who has recently conferred
with officials of the Automobile Club
of Southern California, and bases his
statements on their figures.
