Siletz was very much surprised when Adjutant General White ordered the National Guard of the Coast Artillery Company Number 486 of Newport and Toledo, under command of Captain Harry Price, to go to Siletz and hold Memorial services over the graves of Paul and Andrew Washington who lost their lives in the World War, as no announcement had previously been made that they were coming to Siletz. Had this been known sooner a basket dinner in the Chalcraft Park would have been prepared for them, but as it was a good dinner was prepared for them at the Hotel King. It was the most important and impressive Memorial service ever held at Siletz.

Rev. C. W. Pogue assisted in the services and had charge of the program and assisted in the service which follows: Two selections by the Newport band; prayer by Rev. John Adams; address by Rev. C. W. Pogue. A selection by the band; sounding of taps and the firing of three volleys by the squad closed the impressive Memorial ceremonies at Siletz.

Mr. Monson with his family have moved in a cottage at Siletz and is now engaged with a force of hands in the construction of the steel bridge that is to span the Siletz river at the place where the bridge washed out last winter.

The teachers, high school and eight, grade pupils to the number of 35 took a hike to Newport and the light house in the big truck of the Hall Brothers which was driven by Mr. Huey who is considered to be one of the safest and most careful drivers on the road. The party reported as having a most excellent time. While at the lighthouse each one went up in the hundred foot tower, saw the great light that flashes out upon the ocean more than twenty miles. From this tower a most magnificent view is presented to the eye—to the east on a range of mountains rises above the other till they appear to reach the sky and from the west as far as the eye can reach the great swells and waves of the ocean come rushing in and break upon the rock bound shore that sends the spray more than a hundred feet high presenting a kaleidoscopic view almost impossible to describe.

Mrs. Maurice Andersen and Mrs. E. Colvin teachers in the public school, treated the primary and grade pupils to ice cream and cake Wednesday. They also reported as having a good time. This closes the work of the school year at Siletz, and the teachers have gone to their respective homes feeling that their work has been a success and that the pupils under their care have been trained and advanced greatly along the path of education.

Both Tatom and Norton said some two dozen different tribes and remnants numbering some 3000 persons were held on the Siletz reservation, and about half that number on the years at the fort he made frequent excursions into hostile territory and Grande Ronde. During Sheridan's two roundups restless savages and brought them to the reserve.

The facts of the building of Fort Hoskins were related by Dr. P. M. Carter of Siletz, who said two questions are now being answered—where Fort Hoskins was located, and whether it was built by Phil Sheridan. He gave the Lakiamute site as authentic and Sheridan as the builder in 1856.

Two boys of the period, Fowler Brothers—C. A. and S. W.—of Corval-

ls, lived just across the meadow from the early fort when it was built by soldiers under Sheridan. They were born in this valley. C. A. was five and J. W. 10 when the fort was built. Their parents often entertained Sheridan as a visitor and the father, G. A. Fowler, was official huntsman for the garrison. These men at least have no doubt as to where Fort Hoskins was located a little more than half a century ago.
