M. on the 7th day of July, 1922, for the following work: The construction of three bridges across the Siletz River, the location of said bridges being as follows: (a)—Logsdon Post Office; (b)—About one mile northwest of Siletz Post Office on the Siletz-Mowery's Landing Road at the site of the old bridge on said road, known as "Louie Fuller Bridge." (c)—About three miles northwest of Siletz on the Siletz-Mowery's Landing Road at the point on said river where the former bridge was located known as the "Ojala Bridge." Proposals can be made on either of said bridges, under the following propositions: Project No. 1: Construction of a wooden bridge; Project No. 2: Construction of a steel structure. All proposals must be presented under sealed cover to the County Court of Lincoln County at the time and place stated above, and must be endorsed "Proposal for the construction of the Bridge" (Supply name of bridge). Each bid shall be accompanied by cash, a bidder's bond made payable to Lincoln County, or a certified check made payable to the treasurer of said county, for an amount equal to at least five (5) per cent of the total amount of said bid, and no bid need be considered unless said cash, bond or check is enclosed. Said bidder's bond shall be conditioned that if said bid be accepted, the party bidding shall duly enter into and execute the contract. Plans, specifications and bidders' blanks for the above work may be examined at the County Clerk's office or may be obtained from Mr. A. L. Porter, County Engineer, Toledo Oregon.
