Saturday Night**

Large Crowd Witness Mat Match; Miller Aggressor in First Hour While Olson Has Better Condition.

Wrestling fans of this section turned out in strength to witness the Miller-Olson match held in the fair building here last Saturday night and, although, Olson seemed to be in much better condition than Miller, nevertheless he was unable to get a fall from the gritty "Smiling" Charlie. Miller was the aggressor in the first hour and worked hard to gain a hold that would produce a fall. Olson however seemed to have strength to spare whenever it was needed to break whatever hold that Miller clamped on. Time after time he seemed to deliberately allow Miller to clamp on a headlock, but on each instance the Swede would pull himself free, feel to see if his ears were still there and allow Miller to have the hold again.

It was a disappointment to many of Olson's admirers that he did not show more speed and pin Miller to the mat, but, although Miller weakened in the last half hour, nevertheless he seemed to be the Swede's equal on all occasions. Miller was not in the condition to withstand the awful punishment that two hours' wrestling requires and collapsed in his corner immediately after the match was over, while Olson seemed to be as fresh as when he started.

"He is the slowest and strongest man I ever met," stated Miller after the match. "If I had some way of getting into proper condition I am sure I could handle him, but farming and wrestling don't go well together, especially when you have as tough a man as Olson to meet."

Young Charlie Miller and another Toledo boy somewhat smaller gave a splendid exhibition of wrestling as a

preliminary to the main event. Miller got the first fall but the little fellow came back and showed real aggressiveness in the last two rounds and the match was called a draw.

Two referees were in the ring during the Miller-Olson match and their decisions seemed to please the fans. They were Mr. Thomas and Ed. Anderson of Salem.

**Olson vs. Dickson

Chas. Olson (The Terrible Swede) of Albany, won from Hobart Dickson Tuesday night in the second round of a mixed wrestling and fighting bout at the fair building before a small crowd that gathered to witness the affair.

Fowlkes, insurance head of the United States Veterans' Bureau, who has charge of the campaign. Every ex-service man of Washington, Oregon and Idaho will be urged to reinstate his war risk insurance. The quota of veterans' insurance to be renewed by former service men of Toledo has been set at 50,000. The campaign has the endorsement of Norman W. Engle, northwest representative of the American Legion, and all posts have been urged to cooperate actively in the reinstatement of war insurance totaling \$5,000,000 in the district. 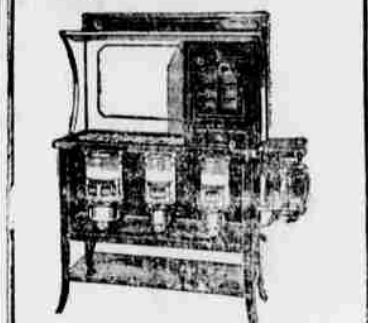
**NATIONAL GUARD TO
