OVERCURING SPOILS HAY
Much good hay is spoiled each year by being left too long in the swath, winnow or shock. A very much better quality of baled-hay or loose may be had by curing the hay out as rapidly as possible and putting it in the mow or stack where it is not exposed to light. It may then be baled up with better moisture content and better color and quality.
