

SILETZ

The Minist Brothers closed their camp meeting Sunday evening. After the rain commenced the meeting was moved to the church. Elder Grout, the evangelist, is a very able, logical and eloquent speaker. His sermons were plain, forcible and easily understood by all. The singing was unusually good, led by Prof. C. B. Witte. Towards the close of the meeting some 10 or 12 went forward to the altar seeking a change of heart and a new life. On two occasions the beautiful song selected by Rev. C. R. Ellsworth to be sung at his funeral, "I Will Shout His Praise in Glory." This song expressed the feelings and faith of Mr. Ellsworth after a long life of Christian work in a most beautiful way. He believed in what he preached and felt that the happiness of real life will just commence when we reach the other shore. The song was sung by special request and it made a deep impression on the audience.

On Thursday we were visited by a former agent of Siletz, Major T. J. Buford of Harlan, accompanied by his wife, Mrs. Pearl Lake, and her sons, Ray and Lew, of Los Angeles, and Mrs. Ira Wade and children of Toledo. This party spent the day at Mrs. Marie Anderson's old friends. Mrs. Lake drove her car from Los Angeles. It had been 23 years since she and Mrs. Anderson had met having been children together in Siletz. They had a glorious time recounting old and recent events.

Supt. Chalcraft and his clerk, C. E. Larson, were on a business trip to Portland and Major Buford did not get to see them. However, he was pleased with the looks of things and took great pleasure in going over the grounds he once knew so well. He noted many changes that had taken place since he was here as agent. He met many of his Indian friends and had a good visit with them. He has faith in Lincoln county and a warm place in his heart for Siletz. He promised to make another visit some future time. He looks well and doesn't grow old very fast. Youthful looks and beauty still stays with him.

We are still bothered with moonshine. Last week a sewing machine man, pretty well filled up with the vile stuff, passed through Siletz, driving at break-neck speed; came near running over two Indian women. They had to dodge right and left to get out of his way as he zig-zagged from one side of the road to the other. In such cases you hardly have time to think before you are knocked into a cocked hat—a swish, a thud and you are in the "happy hunting grounds." Some five or six fatalities have already occurred in this county and the Lord only knows how many more will be killed if the manufacture and use of the rotten stuff is not stopped. It is a plain violation of law for any intoxicated person to drive a car and it is also a violation of the law to exceed the speed limit, and a good citizen will not try to beat the law. If a law is bad the best way to get rid of it is to enforce it.

Sunday evening a couple of Indian girls got hold of some moonshine and were soon crazy drunk and fought each other like tigers; yelled and screamed so that you could hear them all over town; pulled hair and kicked like a couple of professional boxers; knocked window lights out and broke a wind shield out of a car. This is an exhibition of what moonshine is doing and the fellows who gave it to the girls ought to be made to feel the forceful hand of the law for such acts.
