Final Arrangements Being Made For Entertainment of Crowds; People Urged to Attend Show Every Day.

Present Indications Point to Wonderful Display of All Industries of Vicinity; Competent Judges Secured.

Next Wednesday Morning September 6th, will mark the opening of Lincoln County's Ninth Annual Fair. It will also bring together the people from every section of the County, as well as from other outside points, to get a close-up view of our County's Natural and abundant resources. We most assuredly have been highly favored by them, and have lost their greatest opportunity for advancement if for any reason we individually or collectively fail to come out in large numbers and actually demonstrate and co-operate in the furthering of this plan, which has been worked out and operated so long and so successfully.

It is quite true that the primary attempts to accomplish a given task may not always meet up with the hearty approval of all. However if the attempt has been an earnest one, as has or will be demonstrated by action, then there is always a feeling between the active co-operators in such project that shall become a lasting tribute to the cause to which they have willingly given of their energy.

The opening day of the Fair shall see an increase in the various entries in all of the Departments, if the indications in hand at the present date, are at least partially carried out as planned, by the exhibitors. As it is always a Human trait to hold back until the last, to tell to the world, that they expect to even do more than they have agreed to do.

There will be some excellent individual displays. Community Exhibits, Livestock, vegetables, fruits, grains and grasses, Industrial Club Exhibits. The women are determined that they will put over in grand style, the work of the Departments which have been laid out for their individual direction.

There has been an immense amount of work performed on the grounds and buildings during the past three weeks, and they are gradually shaping themselves into condition to make everyone comfortable for the coming Four-Day Festival.

Competent Judges have been secured for all departments as follows: Domestic Science and Art—Miss Jessie D. McComb, Head of the Home Economics Department, at Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Oregon.

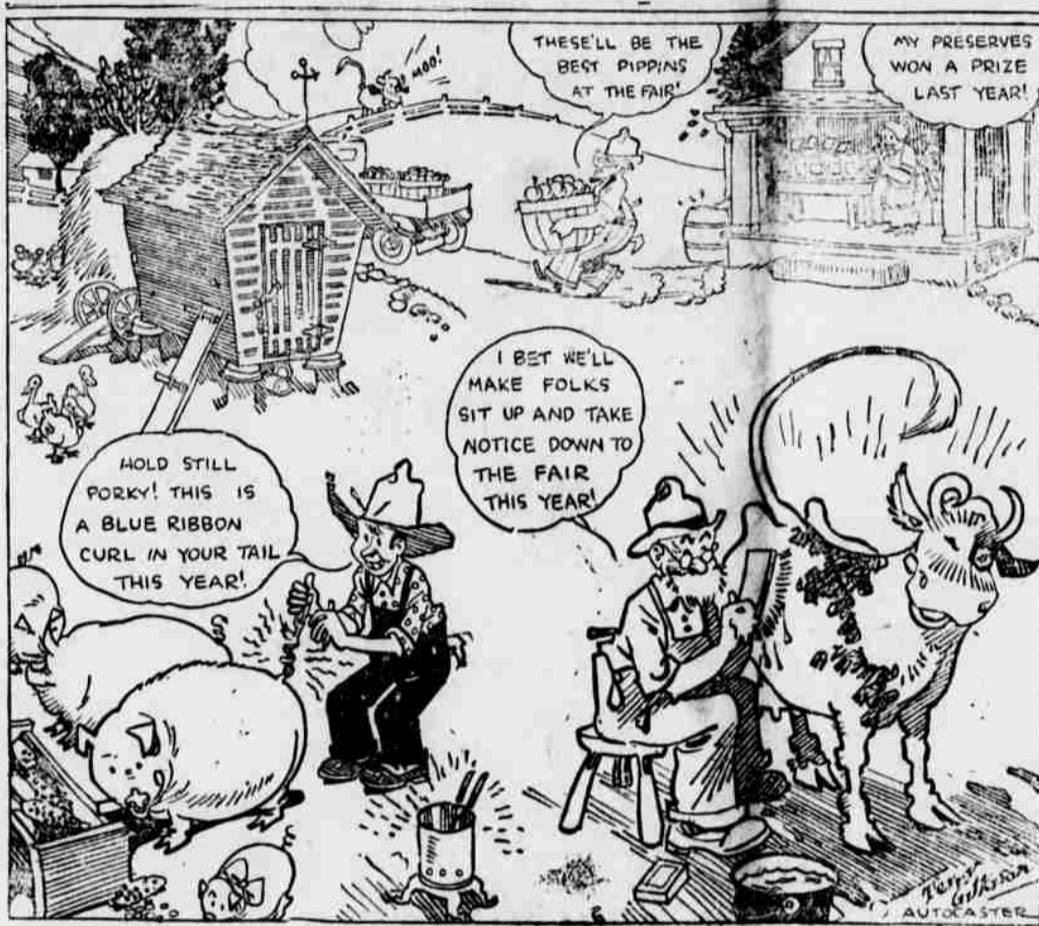

## TELEPHONE LINE IS COMPLETED TO CITY WATER DAM

Several Southside Residents to Receive Telephone Service Over Line Erected by City; Line Self-Supporting.

Under the supervision of the water committee of the City Council, City Engineer A. J. McMillan has completed the telephone line to the City water dam that is now under course of construction on Mill Creek about four miles from Toledo. The line follows the pipe line and can be inspected at any time by the man patrolling the pipe line.

Many Southside people will connect with the line and thereby receive telephone service. They will be required to install the branch lines and all necessary apparatus. They will be required to pay a fee of 50 cents per month to the Telephone Co. for service and 75 cents per month to the city for the use of the line. These fees will make the line self supporting according to Mr. McMillan.
