

AGED WIDOW OF LINN SHERIFF IN 1872 IS VISITOR FROM COAST

Mrs. Allen A. Parker and Mrs. Mary E. Parker have arrived in Albany from Toledo, to spend a few days visiting at the home of Mrs. Frances Howard. Mrs. Allen Parker is Mrs. Mary Parker's mother and will be 90 years old in January. Her home is at Toledo.

Allen Parker was Sheriff of Linn county in 1872 and mayor of Albany in 1876. In 1880 Mr. Parker was elected to the state legislature from Benton county and was reelected in 1882.

Mr. and Mrs. Parker crossed the plains by ox team in 1853 and settled about three miles from Albany. At that time Mrs. Parker says that there were only two or three small cabins on the Albany prairie. A few years later Mr. Parker built a large grain warehouse on the bank of the Willamette river where the Red Crown flour mills now stands. Mrs. Parker and daughter Mrs. Mary Parker will leave
