NOTICE OF STREET IMPROVEMENT.

Notice is hereby given of the intention of the City of Toledo, Oregon to cause to be improved that portion of Hill street of Toledo, Oregon, between the following points, Hill street from the north side of the intersection of Hill and Fifth streets and the south side of the intersection of Hill street with the State Highway near Seventh street. Said portion of said street to be improved in the manner as follows: by grading the full width thereof to correspond to the established grade, and by paving through the center thereof a width of 40 feet with concrete with a curb 6 inches wide on each side.

Grade and subgrade to be thoroughly compacted.
Paving to be Standard one course concrete pavement 6 inches in thickness of 1-2-3 mix laid a width of 40 feet from inner curb line to inner curb line with curbs on each side as follows: curbs to extend six inches below base line of pavement and six inches above surface line of pavement; curbs to be six inches in thickness and Standard one course concrete of 1-2-3 mix.

Improvement to be made according to plans and specifications of grade, sub-grade, pavement, and curbs now on file in the office of the City Recorder.

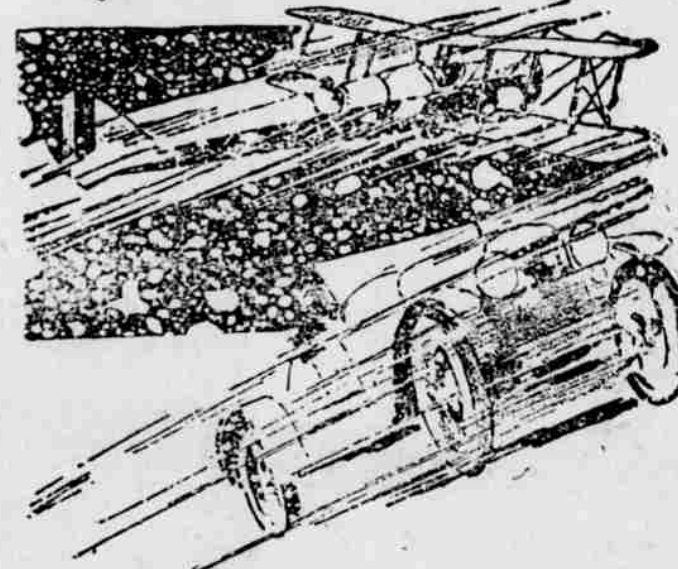
