The forenoon was taken up with singing and a discussion of the county unit plan by Prof. Goin, who explained pretty fully the provisions of the law. Mr. Goin is well posted in the law and told us how it would work in this county. He says it will equalize taxes and reduce them and be a benefit to the small and weaker districts.

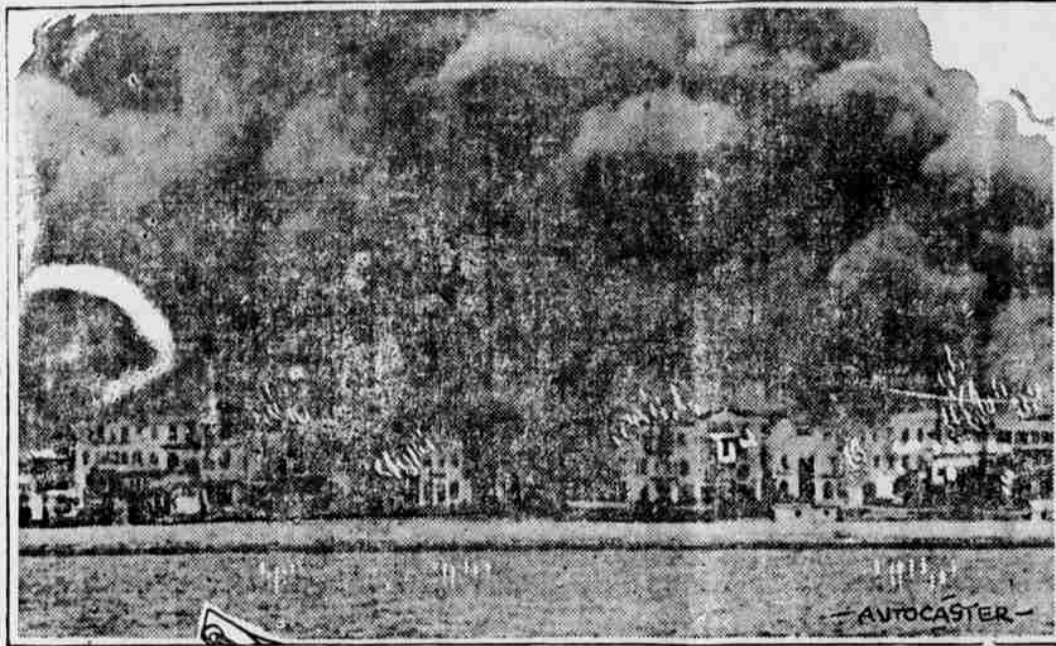

discussion was very interesting and profitable to all who heard it. The visiting teachers were well pleased with the kind treatment they received from the people of Siletz.

The Sunday school elected the following officers for the ensuing year: Mr. Hoffman, supt; Mrs. Arthur Bessell, assistant; M. S. Colvin, clerk; Mrs. Linda Kimbel, pianist; with Mary Alice Bensell assistant.

Mr. W. S. Hall declined to serve longer as superintendent. He has served in that capacity for more than fifteen years. Under his efficient management and with corps of faithful teachers the school had grown and prospered, the average attendance for the year about 50. Mr. Hall will continue in the schools as a teacher.

On Sunday evening about thirty of the friends and neighbors met at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Hall to give them a surprise party it being their 14th anniversary of wedded life. A nice luncheon was served. Singing and a good social time was enjoyed by all present. The most exciting part of the celebration was caused by taking Mr. and Mrs. Hall from the house and placing them in a two wheeled cart and gave them a joy ride over the principal streets of the town. They will always remember this episode, we believe.
