LOCAL INTELLIGENCE.

Decisions. By Grand Lodge of Oregon, at its last Session. TO THE GRAND LODGE, I. O. G. T.: Your Committee to whom were referred certain questions, report as follows: 1. Can two or more candidates for initiation be balloted for at one time? Ans. Yes; but in case one or more black balls appear, the ballot shall then be taken upon each applicant separately.

The Committee on Appeals submitted the following: QUESTION: Bro. "A," of Peoria Lodge, No. 260, I. O. G. T., was charged with having violated his obligation, and after due trial, was found guilty. Lodge then proceeded to punish by suspending Bro. "A," for one month—after the expiration of that time to re-obligate him.

The above reports were adopted. In the case of Bro. "A," of Peoria Lodge, the Lodge should have required his re-obligation before the suspension; then if, during suspension, he violated the obligation again, he would be liable to a penalty. You will notice that his re-obligation took place at the expiration of his suspension, and after he had drank the second time.

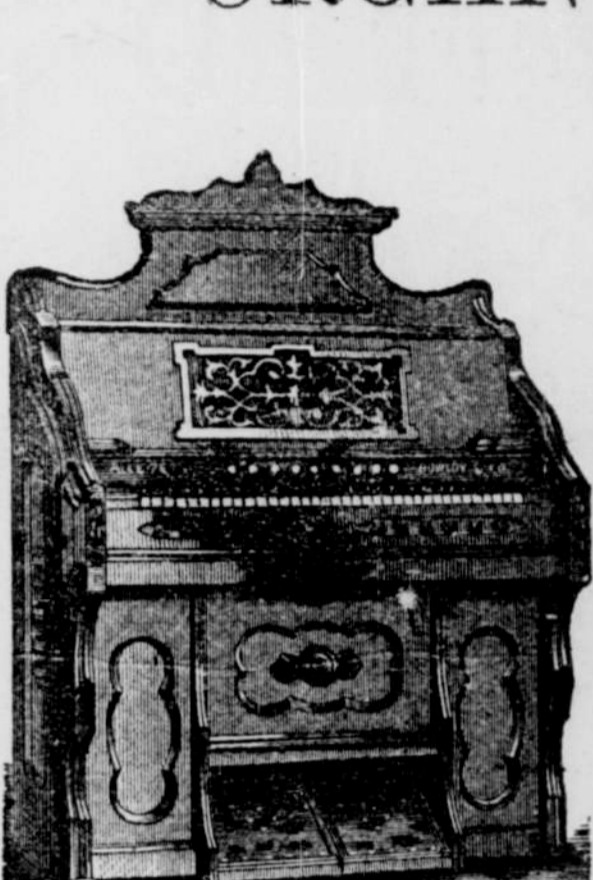
