**A BLESSING IN HOP-TEA.**

A Sacramento lady sends the *Record* a note, in which she says that if strong hop tea is applied with the hand to any surface where pain is seated, it will, in most cases, instantly disappear. The tea should be a very strong infusion, and applied when milk-warm, and by the palm of the hand. Dip the hand into it, apply, and rub briskly several times. If the pain has been long seated more frequent and longer applications will be necessary. She goes as far as to say in rheumatism, neuralgia, pleurisy, etc., it has proven useful. Persons of debilitated constitutions, she adds, can find benefit from hop foot-baths, followed by rubbing, by a person of nervous temperament. She says it revives the aged, too, and adds other wonders which it performs. She makes these statements, she adds, with a view to elicit remark from scientific quarters. The soothing qualities of hops are well known, and physicians frequently apply fomentations of hops to relieve pain, but she is anxious to ascertain what virtue there is in rubbing. In one case, and rubbing by a nervous person in the other case, and asks: "Is it the hop-tea, the rubbing or the nervous one or are all three of effect, and would the hop decoction alone be ineffective? As hops are used as a medicine in every household, any particular method of using them should excite inquiry."

**HOW TO JUDGE PERSONS BY THEIR WALK.**
