Fisher and S. H. Lucas, Santa Fe, N. M., combined push-pin and watch-key; W. P. Lewis, Oroville, Cal., pneumatic tubes for dredging; I. O. Mann and G. R. Rankin, Lake City, Colo., metallic counters or stiffeners for boots and shoes; J. Sherrill, Harrisburg, Ogn., cultivator; C. Raetz, S. F., machine for cutting sugar cubes.
