Mr. William M. Torner, formerly of Jacksonville, Oregon, special Indian agent, now acting in concert with Major Rhinehart of Malheur reservation, arrived at Boise City on Thursdar, the 23d inst. Mr. Turner left the Malheur Agency a few days ago, accompanied by chief Egan, for the purpose of hunting up the Indians belonging to that reservation who are now scattered among the settlements in Idaho, and causing them to return to the reservation. Major Rhinehart and Mr. Turner are, says the Stateswan, both determined that these Indians shall no longer prove a cause of annoyance to the settlers. On the Weiser there are few Indians belonging to the Malheur reservation who have been seen and instructed to return home. A small band of Indians under Eagle Eye have been informed that if they will go to the Malheur Agency they will be received and some provisions made for them, though they are not among the Indians | Shoes at the of whom Major Rhinehart has charge. Mr. Turner has gone to see Winnemucca and his band who are somewhere near Silver City. No danger or trouble is apprehended from the presence of these Indians, but it is better for both whites and Indians that the the latter should be kept upon the reservation of their agents. For their efforts in this direction the two gentlemen mentioned are deserving of much praise and should meet with the hearty GROCERIES, co-operation of citizens .- Sentinel
