

GENERAL NEWS.

[Condensed from Oregonian and Call Dispatches.]

Chicago, Nov. 15.—The architect of the building in which the fire occurred says it can be restored for one hundred and fifty thousand dollars at the outside, and that the damages have been overestimated.

Topeka, Kas., Nov. 15.—A severe shock of earthquake was felt here about ten minutes before twelve, today.

Atchison, Kas., Nov. 15.—Several distinct shocks of earthquake were felt here today about noon.

Washington, Nov. 16.—The President to-day nominated Benjamin F. Peitotto, of California, U. S. Consul General to St. Petersburg.

Chicago, Nov. 16.—A London special dated Poreidin, Tuesday, says: The Russians, yesterday, summoned Osman Pasha to surrender. Osman refused. A special from Athens states that the Prince of Montenegro invited Greece to co-operate in the invasion of Albania.

Constantinople, Nov. 16.—The Russians have been repulsed near Kars after prolonged fighting. There has been a heavy snow in Asia. A council of war, under the presidency of the Sultan decided to largely re-enforce Mehemet Ali. Rumors of peace negotiations are denied.

Montpelier, Vt., Nov. 17.—Asa McGown, the wife murderer, was sentenced to be hanged on the fourth Friday of November 1879, with six months hard labor and six months solitary confinement in the interim.

Hartford, Conn., Nov. 17.—Rev. Jonathan Edwards of Woodbridge, aged 75, formerly editor of the Boston Recorder, died to-day.

New York, Nov. 19.—Oskey Hall is advertised to lecture in Boston and other cities in the east.

White Hall, N. Y., Nov. 19.—Fort Edward Institute, Ft. Edward, N. Y. burned this evening. The students—nearly 200—escaped, most of them losing clothes and money. Loss, one hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars; insurance, nine thousand dollars. Supposed to have been caused by the explosion of a kerosene lamp.

Topeka Nov. 19th.—Nearly complete returns from the late election give Humphrey, (Republican candidate for Lieut. Governor) 23,396 votes over the other candidates.

London Nov. 19th.—A special dispatch from Alexandria announces that the King of Abyssinia has written Gen. Gordon accepting the terms of peace proposed by the latter.

London Nov. 19.—A special dispatch dated Veran Kaleb, Sunday evening, says the fortress and city of Kars, with 300 canon, stores of ammunition, cash etc., fell into Russian hands. The Turks lost 5,000 killed and wounded, 10,000 prisoners and many flags. Russian loss is about 2,700.

London Nov. 19th.—A dispatch from Sophia reports that the Russians on Friday attacked Etropol and Turkish positions at the entrance of Orchanie defile and were repulsed with heavy loss.
