

GENERAL NEWS.

[Condensed from Oregonian and Call Dispatches.]

New York Nov. 23.—The Herald's Columbia (S. C.) special says: A railway accident occurred today near Charlotte. The train broke through the trestle work and twelve passengers were drowned.

Pittsburg Nov. 23.—Spratt & Johnson's plow works, corner of Lacock and Darragh streets, Alleghany city, was destroyed by fire tonight. Loss \$25,000.

New Orleans Nov. 24.—The sugar house on Arcadia plantation, Iberville parish, the property of Col. R. S. Rivers, was burned Friday night. Cost \$40,000; no insurance.

Lowell, Mass. Nov. 24.—Mrs. Geo. H. Thompson, sister of Senator Sargent of California, has committed suicide.

New York Nov. 24.—Gen. Abraham Duryea, formerly Colonel of the 7th Regiment and ex-police Commissioner, was arrested on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses from a Savings bank.

Versailles (France) Nov. 25.—The senate elected M. Grandperet, Bonapartist, life senator.

Lincoln Nov. 27.—The official vote of the state election was canvassed today showing Lake for chief justice, 15,630; Howe 15,630; for regents, Holmes 29,698; Persinger, 28,937; Grim, 6,915; Cass, 6,330; total, 45,868.

Richmond Nov. 26.—The loss to private property in this city by the flood may be safely estimated at from \$300,000 to \$400,000. Other losses will greatly augment this amount.

Washington Nov. 27.—The cabinet today decided to appoint ex-congressman John B. Hawley, of Illinois, Asst. Secretary of the treasury, to succeed McCormick, whose resignation takes effect the 1st of next month.

Paris Nov. 27.—Newspapers are discussing whether the army will support MacMahon or the republic, in case of a conflict. Manuscript placards, insulting or threatening President MacMahon have been posted. A hundred persons were arrested yesterday for drunkenness, seditious cries and insults or resisting the police.
