ENGLAND ALARMED.

A special London dispatch to the New York Times says: There is no reason whatever for the belief that any move will be taken in violation of the terms of the armistice. One of these terms gives the right to the Russians to take up a position on the line of Buquet Checkmedji, beyond which is a narrow zone not to be occupied by the troops of either belligerent till the result of negotiations is finally decided.

DEATH OF THE POPE

On the 7th inst., died at Rome, the great head of the Catholic Church. Pious IX, whose name before he received holy ordination, was Giovanni Maria Mastai Ferretti, was almost eighty-eight years of age at the time of his death.

THE CHINESE QUESTION.

The following Chicago dispatch, dated Feb. 6, will be read with much interest: The Times Washington special says the House committee on immigration and labor, have agreed unanimously upon a policy regarding Chinese immigration upon the Pacific coast.

CRITICAL.—The latest eastern dispatches state that the sending of a British fleet to Constantinople and the parliamentary vote of credit have produced a profound sensation in Russia.

GENERAL NEWS.

(Condensed from Oregonian and Call Dispatches.)

New Orleans, Feb. 4.—Ex. Gov. Wells was brought to this city by the morning train on the New Orleans and Mobile railroad and was taken to the parish prison. He is suffering from a slight attack of pneumonia.

New York, Feb. 4.—A Washington dispatch says the house committee has agreed to report a bill extending the time for the completion of the Northern Pacific railroad.

Belgrad, Feb. 4.—The Government having received a dispatch from Russian headquarters announcing that the armistice has been signed, has ordered the different Serbian commanders to stop hostilities.

Vienna, Feb. 4.—The cabinet yesterday issued formal invitations to the signatory powers to the treaty of Paris to send representatives to the conference to be held at Vienna.

Chicago, Feb. 5.—The JOURNAL'S Washington special says: The ways and means committee to-day developed great unanimity in favor of recommending Wool's tariff bill for passage as a whole.

Vienna, Feb. 4.—The situation is still reported as serious. It has transpired that Russia is concentrating troops in the interior of Roumania, and 120,000 men will be massed toward the west and north, evidently for defense against Austria.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 7.—A dispatch received to-day from Grand Duke Nicholas announces that in accordance with an understanding between Russian and Turkish plenipotentiaries, free commercial intercourse by land and sea will be immediately re-established between Turkey and Russia.

Rome, Feb. 7, 6 p. m.—The Pope died at 4:57 this afternoon.

Chicago, Feb. 6.—The TRIBUNE'S Washington special says: Hayt, commissioner of Indian affairs, has completed his bill providing for the organization of the Indian police on the various Indian Reservations.

New Orleans, Feb. 7.—Judge Whitaker charged the jury at 9:30 to-night and they retired. Nobody expected a verdict to-night, but at 10 o'clock a loud knock from the jury room announced that a verdict had been reached.

St. Catharines, Feb. 8.—A man named McGuire alias McGarry, was arrested at Thorold to-day charged with having committed murder in Pittsburgh, Penn. He is said to be one of the Molly Maguires.

Washington, Feb. 7.—The house committee on education and labor to-day agreed to report a bill to distribute the proceeds of the sale of public lands among the several states for the purpose of education.

London, Feb. 8.—After debate in the committee, the vote of 6,000,000 pounds passed by a division of 328 to 124, amidst cheers from the conservatives.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 10.—Latest official intelligence from Adrianople shows that a complete understanding has been arrived at between Russian headquarters and Turkish delegates.

San Francisco, Feb. 8.—In the criminal court to-day on motion of the prosecuting attorney, the sureties of Kearney, Wellock, Knight and other agitators were released from any further responsibility.

STATE NEWS.

Hon. J. S. Smith of Portland, having been frequently mentioned as a probable candidate for Governor, publishes a card in the STANDARD of the 5th inst. in which he says: "The condition of my health is such as to constrain me to forego all aspiration in that direction."

Hon. D. M. C. Gouth, for some time local editor of the STATESMAN, has retired. D. M. C. filed the place quite creditably.

The STATESMAN says that Carl Steinburg stole \$220 from Mrs. Bohns, his land lady, at Vancouver last week. He was arrested in Oregon City and the lady sent for. She came and recovered her money and cheated the penitentiary out of a boarder by compromising with the thief.

Gen. J. W. Nesmith has taken the room on behalf of the West Side railroad. He spoke at Ferrydale on Thursday of last week. So says the OREGONIAN.

The Grant county TIMES urges the construction of a road for freight, from Winnemucca to Canyon City. It says such a road would cost only \$3,000.
