OREGON GREENBACK CONVENTION.

ALBANY, April 3, 1878. After election of chairman and secretary, as previously announced, the following committees were announced. On credentials—W. I. Mayfield, P. A. Graves, L. Bentley. On permanent organization—O. V. Carter, Geo. Whitney, W. R. Henry, J. C. Small, A. J. Woodworth. Order of business—G. W. Lawson, W. McClary, J. R. Bayley. The committee on permanent organization recommended that the temporary officers be elected permanent officers of the convention. Report adopted. Pending the reception of the report of the several committees, remarks were made by Hon. G. W. Lawson, Hon. Elisha L. Applegate and A. C. Edmonds Esq. After the adoption of platform, the convention proceeded to nominate a candidate for congress. A. J. Dufur, of Multnomah; L. N. Butler, and Prof. T. F. Campbell, both of Polk county, were placed in nomination. Prof. T. F. Campbell was nominated on the first ballot, the vote standing, Campbell 28, Butler 18, Dufur 7. The nomination of M. Wilkins of Lane, for Governor was carried by acclamation. For secretary of state N. T. Cates of Union, was nominated, also by acclamation. F. Sutherland of Douglas, was nominated for state treasurer. D. W. Craig of Marion, was nominated for state printer, and W. W. Parker of Clatsop, for superintendent of public instruction. Members of the party claim that there was great enthusiasm at the convention, and talk rather extravagantly of its chances of success.—Oregonian.
