SEATTLE, W. T., Aug. 26, '78. ED. TIDINGS .- When one hears of a place, he is certain to conceive a picture of it in his mind, and it is just as certain to be an untrue one. When I left Ashland, I took a mental map of the route to this place, but was not guided by it throughout. In the evening before I left the metropolis of "adhesive dust," (Roseburg), I tried to purchase my ticket to be in readiness for the morrow, but the official refused till half an hour before train left, which was 5 A. M.

As you dash along in the cool morning, you feel that you are playing life on a high key and after riding 18 miles to Oakland, you can take breakfast with a relish.

A writer once described Umpaus valley as being composed of small vales. He said; To get a clear conception, take a lot of pumpkins, halve them, and place them flat side on the ground, the edges close together; then the spaces will represent the little valleys of Umpqua. The ascent and descent through the pass in the Calipooia mountains, are so gradual that you can scarcely realize that there is any mountain there. There the great Willamette valley spreads out its field of ripening grain for miles on either side, bordered on the east by the Cascades, and the west by the Coast Range of mountains. which are surmounted by an occasional snowy peak.
