INDIAN CHANGES.—A correspondent of the East Oregonian, says: "I am informed by Mr. J. B. Monteith, Indian Agent at Lapwai, who is now here on his way home from Washington City, that measures are soon to be adopted by the government to remove the Umatilla Indian Agency, and Indians to the care of Father Wilbur, and the land to be sold in lots of 160 acres each for the benefit of the Indians and the removal will be consummated at an early day."

State News A fatal horse disease prevails about Newberg, Yamhill county. The Coast Mail reports the finding of a cool bed six feet above tide water on Coos river.

Thirty three thousand bushels of wheat arrived at the Farmers' warehouse in Albany during January. Two non-commissioned officers belonging to Co E, First cavalry have been reduced to the ranks for staying at the Dalles without permission.

The term of the state circuit court at Portland which adjourned last Saturday, after being in session 82 days, cost Multnomah county the round sum of \$16,440 02.

Salem Statesman: "We learn from a gentleman who has recently been traveling through Lion, Lane and Benton counties, that the frosts have not in the least injured the wheat. That everywhere the wheat looks green and thrifty, promising a heavy harvest the coming year."

A letter from Weston, Umatilla county, states that stock has suffered a good deal, and some will probably perish. Money is scarce; everything that is produced to be sold is very low, and everything that must be bought is very high. The uncertainties of the Indian situation make matters worse.

Lafayette Courier: The project of extending the Dayton, Sheridan and Grand Round railroad to Portland is likely to be accomplished. Plans were informed on good authority that the work will be taken in hand and pushed through quickly. Meetings are to be held in a short time at the various places along the proposed route between Dayton and Portland.

Pendleton East Oregonian: New mines are being discovered along Snake river, near the Salmon Falls, which are very rich. The deeper the better. Nine dollars per day has been made to the man at Payne's ferry, two miles from a small town, and a few miles below have been averaging \$15 to the man ever since they started up last February. The river banks are rich with fine gold.

Heavy business failures continue in England. It is rumored that the Brooklyn Presbytery is to discipline Talmadge.

An agitation on Chinese immigration is prevailing in New South Wales. McMahon resigned the Presidency of the French Republic on the 30th ult.

The third installment of the Mexican indemnity (\$300,000) has been paid. The trial of the City of Glasgow Bank Directors at Edinburgh resulted in their conviction.

During the month of January the subscriptions to the four per cent loan aggregated \$155,851,150. A frightful disaster is reported from Baltimore—a schooner found with ten dead men lashed to her deck.

Seven thousand miners are idle in Durham, Eng., and the distress is unequal since the great strike of 1844. Mr. Clara S. F. Jz has been admitted in the Fourth District Court, at San Francisco to the practice of law.

A strong feeling exists among leading colored citizens of Louisiana favoring migration to other parts of the Union.

It is proposed in Russia to burn the plague infected villages, together with all the furniture contained in the houses.

A terrible tornado occurred at Inks, Mo., this week causing several deaths and destroying four houses and a church.

Wild Hog, the Cheyenne chief, was killed at Fort Robinson, Neb., making a desperate attempt to kill himself the other day.

About 300 renegade Indians are encamped at the mouth of the Okanogan river, in Washington Territory, and trouble is feared in the spring.

S. W. Hall, who was taken from Washington Territory to Illinois on the belief that he was Geo. S. Holliday, a defaulting County Treasurer has been released.
