

ASHLAND COLLEGE AND NORMAL SCHOOL

In another place in this paper will be found the advertisement of this educational institution, containing announcement of time of opening, terms, etc. In addition to the information given in the advertisement, we take the following from the regular pamphlet announcement: "The college will be chartered; and the normal or training school for teachers will be made, it is hoped by special enactment, an adjunct of the Public School system, and diplomas made equivalent to first grade certificates. Ashland has no saloons. The sale of intoxicating liquors is prohibited by the city authorities, who are sustained by a strong public sentiment.

The school will be under the supervision of an evangelical christian church. The Bible will be reverently read and studied; the worship of God encouraged; but the institution will be sectarian in no objectionable sense. Book-keeping, business arithmetic, English composition and other branches specially preparatory for business life, will receive unusual attention.

The preceptress will give her chief attention to the care and oversight of the young ladies. An endowment of \$20,000 will be, there is reason to hope, promptly subscribed, enabling the trustees to reduce the present rates of tuition, especially to teachers, at the present year.

The business men of Roseburg are awaking to the fact that there is danger of their Jackson county transportation business slipping away from them. The "Independent" of last week contains an article upon the subject of roads in which the writer suggests that the people of Jackson and Douglas counties unite in a movement having for its object the permanent improvement of the road between Jacksonville and Roseburg.

Better roads are greatly to be desired by the people of both counties and would be a great convenience to Jackson county merchants, but, inasmuch as Siskiyou county is offering strong inducements for the teaming trade in this section it would seem that the people of Douglas have a rather deeper interest in the improvement of the roads in question than have we, and consequently they should make the initial move, and rather coax us, "as it were," to join them. We are in a position to be coquetish.

Frederick Billings, the newly-elected President of the Northern Pacific railroad Company, is just the man needed to push the construction of the road at the most rapid rate possible. He is one of the largest capitalists interested in the road, and has invested more money in it than anyone else. A short time since Mr. Billings and others subscribed for an additional loan of \$3,000,000 to be used in building the 300 miles of road which is to be done this year.

After the extension of the eastern end of the road to the Yellowstone and the completion of the 100 miles from the Columbia to Lake Pen d'Orcelle, the company contemplate running a line of stages to carry passengers and mail over the 500 miles between the two sections of road.

Even millionaires have to pay some tribute to public opinion. It has just leaked out that William H. Vanderbilt was so much worried by the current comment on his affidavit of last winter that he hadn't any personal property liable to taxation, that he finally walked up to the captain's office and plunked down \$12,750, being the tax on half a million dollar which he volunteered for assessment.

The New York Tribune calls attention to the fact that \$40,000 is about the size of the saving which the country is realizing every day in the "litter" matter of interest alone, as the result of the funding operations so triumphantly carried through by Secretary Sherman.

The Working men's Convention assembled in San Francisco, nominated Wm. F. White for Governor, and J. H. McKune, of Sacramento, J. H. Budd, of San Joaquin, and C. A. Tuttle, of Alameda, for Railroad Commissioners.

The Warner Silver bill will not be acted upon until next session of Congress, the Senate finance committee having decided not to report it until the first Monday in December.

It is stated upon good authority that the President will sign the appropriation bills in the form which the majority in Congress has decided upon.

Gen. James Shields, late U. S. senator from Missouri, died suddenly at Ottumwa, Iowa, on the 1st of June.

The decision of the Supreme Court on the Thurman bill to compel the Central Pacific Railroad Company to set aside a portion of its annual earnings as a sinking fund has already turned into the national treasury \$4,000,000, of the net earnings of the company since the passage of the bill. This would have been a neat little dividend for the stockholders of the C. P. if the decision had been against the bill.
