

THE ELECTIONS.

Elections were held in eleven states last Tuesday, the most important, with reference to their bearing upon national politics being in New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Massachusetts and Connecticut.

In New York Cornell (Rep.) is elected Governor by a plurality of about 40,000 over Robinson, Anti-Tammany Democrat. Most of the other state offices have been carried by the Republicans, who have small majorities. This is claimed as a Democratic triumph, as Robinson would have been elected with many votes to spare, had it not been for the Tammany split.

Pennsylvania gives a Republican majority of over 50,000, a gain of nearly 30,000 over last year. The Times says: "While no intelligent observer of political events expected the Democrats to succeed in either city or state yesterday, nobody calculated on such a sweeping Republican victory."

This gives the Republicans the legislature, and will consequently elect a Republican Senator in the place of Wallace (Democrat).

In Massachusetts Long (Rep) beats Butler for Governor by about 13,000 votes, considerably less than Talbot's plurality last year. Adams (Dem.) received a very small vote.

In New Jersey the Republicans have secured control of both branches of the legislature. In Maryland, Virginia and Mississippi the Democratic majorities were sweeping, although in Virginia the vote was cut up by the issue of the proposed debt repudiation.

In Connecticut the Republicans have made great gains, and have a majority of 60 on joint ballot in the legislature.

In Minnesota the Republicans elected their entire state ticket by majorities ranging from 10,000 upward.

In Wisconsin the Republican ticket has a majority of over 20,000. Republican gains are reported in Kansas, Nebraska and Illinois.

A Washington correspondent of the Baltimore Sun writes: "Advice received here from Democratic leaders of high national repute, especially from Southern public men, leave no doubt that a broadly National and conservative course will characterize the Democratic policy the coming winter. Zealots will be made to take back seats. Passionate declarations, tropical rhetoric and sectional recrimination will be severely sat down upon. Republicans will be furnished no more campaign thunder, in the shape of the foolish utterances of excited orators, addressed to backwoods audiences at home, rather than the intelligence of Congress and the country. The above sentiments are in the interest of the Bayard boom. A systematic programme has been in preparation in the Southern States to secure their delegations for Bayard in the coming Democratic Convention, and the result of the New York election will augment the movement greatly."

The average salary paid male school teachers in Arizona is \$110 a month. Female teachers are paid \$90. In the district of Columbia, males are paid \$120, and females \$80. The State of Nevada pays males \$112, and females \$55. The next State in rank is California, which pays respectively \$85 and \$68. After this the rate of salaries falls off rapidly. Massachusetts pays males eighty-four, but females only thirty-five dollars. In the old states, salaries for males range below sixty, and for females below forty dollars. The exceptions are the territories, which, however, excepting Arizona, pay lower salaries than California. The new Northwestern States are economical in school matters. Minnesota, for instance, pays female teachers but twenty-nine dollars, Nebraska but thirty-two, Iowa but twenty-eight, Wisconsin but twenty-seven, and Kansas but twenty-seven. Maine pays male teachers thirty-five, and females seventeen dollars.

The New York World commenting upon the late election, counsels thus unkindly of Tilden: "Thousands of Republicans turned for Robinson, but he has been beaten because Tilden allowed the impression to prevail that Robinson's cause was his cause. Henceforth no intelligent person will mention him seriously as a possible candidate for the Presidency. Neither will anybody mention him as a possible candidate for the honors of his own state. His position in the politics of his own state is that of a nuptial, who could neither succeed himself nor would allow men to succeed who had in themselves the elements of success, of which he had at least permitted himself to be deprived.

The Philadelphia Times considers the election of Conkling's henchman, Cornell, to the gubernatorial chair of New York to be an injury to the Republican chances of success in that state in 1890. It says: "The election of Cornell to the gubernatorial chair of New York is Republican suicide. It is not a triumph of Republicanism that can stand the test of the considerate judgement of patriotic people; on the contrary, it is the victory of banded plunderers from both political camps, and it is a reproach to Republicanism that is to end Republican supremacy in the Empire State, in the otherwise starless midnight that envelops the crushed Democracy of the North. The success of Cornell must flout in the face of every honest Republican the base uses to which a grand party can be prostituted, and it will be the one hope that gives promise of the great pivotal State of the Union being in the Democratic column in 1890."

The Catholic Bishops of Ireland have adopted a resolution appealing to the Government and to all public bodies and private individuals to help the poor, as the Poor Law Act is insufficient to meet the necessities of the impending crisis. The Bishops at the same time exhort their flock to bear their trials patiently, to respect the rights of others, pay their just debts as fully as they are able, and to obey the laws, while using all peaceful and constitutional means to reform land laws, which is the main cause of the country's poverty and helplessness.

General Sherman's report of the condition of the army, shows that the actual strength of the military force at the disposal of the United States is at present a little more than 20,000, and that this skeleton army is so scattered over the country that its concentration for any purpose is a work of extreme difficulty and expense. It is made clear by him that the force is largely inadequate.

The Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe railroad company contemplate extending their road across the continent to the Pacific coast, and have entered into negotiations with the people of San Diego to make that city their western terminus. It is thought they will soon begin building eastward from San Diego.

The New York Tribune says: It will be strange if the visit of George Jacob Holyoke to this country does not result in the establishment here of a system of cooperative stores for the working classes, such as he has been so largely instrumental in founding and carrying forward to success in Great Britain.
