NITROGEN.

This is commercially the most valuable fertilizing element. It occurs in various forms or states. Organic nitrogen is the nitrogen of animal and vegetable matters generally, existing in the albumen and fibrin of meat and blood, in the uric acid of bird-dung, in the urea and hippuric acid of urine, and in a number of other substances. Some forms of organic nitrogen, as that of blood and meat, are highly active as fertilizers; others, as that of hair and leather, are comparatively slow in their effect on vegetation, unless these matters are reduced to a fine powder or chemically disintegrated. Ammonia and nitric acid are results of decay of organic nitrogen in the soil and manure heap, and are the most active forms of nitrogen. They occur in commerce—the former in sulphate of ammonia, the latter in nitrate of soda.—Exchange.

THE LOCAL PAPER.—Thus aptly and truthfully remarks the Exeter News Letter, on a subject that does not receive the attention it deserves in this or any other community:

"The local paper is an absolute necessity to the county and community where it is published. All the city papers cannot supply the place of the home paper. That should be the first love of every man and woman, for with the paper is the locality identified. The paper gives the county and town where printed much of their importance in the world, and gives in detail the local news, which cannot be gained by any other source. Every week's issue of the paper is so much local history, and the rise, growth, and development of the town and county can be measured and recorded only by the local newspaper that constantly is gathering its items. People do not properly appreciate their home newspaper. The home paper at any price is the cheapest paper one can take."

An extraordinary religious movement is taking place in Sweden, where a petition signed by nearly 25,000 persons has been presented to the King, praying that "the use of the Holy Communion may be free, like the use of God's Word," or, in other words, that the celebration of the communion may take place also out of the churches, and that the celebrants may be other than persons in holy orders. The Ecclesiastical Court at the Cathedral Chapter of Upsala, to whom the petition has been referred, has reported against such an innovation, which, in their opinion, "would eventually destroy the church." The Government will probably refuse the prayer of the petitioners, and the consequence will be a serious split in the Swedish Church. Until very lately there was no religious liberty in Sweden, Roman Catholics and Jews, for instance, being unable to exercise their religion publicly; the consequence being that at present the total number of Jews in Sweden barely amounts to 1,000 persons out of a population of nearly 4,000,000 inhabitants.

About 2,000,000 of trade dollars have gone into circulation, mostly in the West, and as there are still 1,500,000 in store in San Francisco the Director of the mint there refuses to coin any more. The Government makes something by coining and issuing the silver change, which is worth only 85 cents to the dollar. The trade dollar is worth pretty nearly as much as the paper dollar, and might properly be increased.
