Allowing for the exaggeration and burlesque of these figures, there is left enough ground for legitimate complaint against the post office department over those rules. The department may have the legal right to issue such orders and send people's letters to the tomb of correspondence at Washington; but it violates the spirit of the laws in doing so. It is all right to impress the public with the importance of being explicit and accurate in directing their letters, but a very large proportion of our people are intelligent and know what they are about when they write their letters. The amount of inconvenience, loss, and even suffering which would be caused by sending letters, technically inaccurate in directions, to the letter office cannot be estimated. It is the duty of the department to do its best to deliver the people's mail. If neither ingenuity nor guesses will take a letter to the person for whom it is meant, then it must go


