

THE COUNTY TICKETS.

Two county tickets are now in the field, the one nominated by a convention composed of straight Democratic delegates, the other by a mass convention to which were invited and received all citizens who chose to take part, regardless of party predilections. As to which plan of nomination is preferable we need not enter into discussion at this time, although in view of the fact that party principles are not involved in the election of county officers, it seems eminently fitting that nominations be made by a non-partisan convention. The office of Representative may sometimes involve party issues, but the legislature to be elected this time does not elect a U. S. senator, and consequently party interests can be very little affected by the result this year. For Representatives we have presented on the Bedrock ticket Capt. Thos. Smith, of Ashland, and Dr. Stanley, of Sam's valley. Mr. Smith was once a member of the legislature, is an old resident of the county and well known. He is a Democrat to the backbone, but we do not anticipate that he would be a very active or influential representative of our section of the state if elected. With Mr. Stanley we are not personally acquainted, but we hear him spoken of as a man of more than ordinary ability. On the independent ticket are Jacob Ish and W. H. Atkinson. Everybody knows Mr. Ish as one of the solid men of the county—one who has had his eyes open a long time. Mr. Atkinson has been in the county about six years, and although he has kept out of politics his business has brought him into contact with a large number of the citizens, and he is everywhere regarded as one of the most reliable, clear-headed, energetic and honorable business men in the county. In our opinion, and in the opinion of all who know him well, our county could not send to the legislature one who would better represent its interests. For County Commissioners, the present incumbents, E. K. Anderson and T. Magruder, are upon the independent ticket, upon which they were elected last year. The verdict of the voters will be that they have served the people faithfully and satisfactorily and should be retained. Their opponents are A. Alford and Thos. Cook, who are both as far as we know, good men. For County Clerk, the best paying office in the county, the bedrock ticket has Henry Klippel, who is regarded as the leader of his party in the county, and one of its best men. On the independent ticket is T. McKinzie, who is building the steam mill in Jacksonville. For Sheriff, Wm. Bybee, the incumbent, is again on the independent ticket, against Evan T. Reams, of Reams Bros., the other brother of whom held the office once, as will be remembered. Heads or tails? For County Judge the nominees are N. Langell, on the independent ticket, and S. J. Day, upon the Democratic. We have heard nothing worse urged against Mr. Langell than that he is a Republican, but as county Judges do not figure in politics, in office, we do not see that Mr. Langell is at all disqualified by this. As for Judge Day, he has made a record, and it is one that should close his career as an office seeker in this county. He has grown fat upon county "paw" and should be allowed to retire from the arduous duties of toadying to the ring managers and making contracts for the keeping of the state poor at prices which the state will refuse to pay. He has demonstrated that he is incapable of rising above petty partialities and private interests in the administration of his office, and this alone should give him a ticket of leave. The County Judge should sink all personal interests in locality or individuals in his efforts to serve the whole county with an impartial fidelity. There are so many voters in the county who believe Judge Day has not done this that we expect to see him placed where he ought to be on the shelf. For County Treasurer the candidates are both Jacksonville men, and we believe the county funds would be safe with either of them. For School Superintendent the nominees are J. D. Fountain, the present officer, and Levi Willis. Both are personal friends of ours and we know them both to be competent for the position. Mayor Kalloch, of San Francisco, has filed an answer to the complaint on which impeachment proceedings were begun against him. The Alabama Republican State Convention instructed its delegates to Chicago to vote as a unit for Grant.

Brought up to swallow everything which the ring may label "straight Democracy," without the hardihood to inquire as to the quality of the dose, the ring organ at Jacksonville could not be expected to understand what independence is, and hence we are not surprised when it exhibits its incapacity to comprehend our position. Its editor evidently thinks that no newspaper can exist which does not wear the collar of one or the other of the parties, and when it sees that we are not between the same traces that leave their marks upon its fat sides, it very naturally supposes us to be driven by the other party. Well, we can't blame Nickell very much. His nature is but human. The ring pours money into his pockets, and he fears that anything like independence on the part of the voters will endanger the success of the candidates the ring has ordained. Hence he says: Be united, even though it be in bondage and against the best interest of the county. This is a position dangerous to the success of his party. People will think sometimes. Let him show that the candidates he is compelled to support are the best in the field, or the best that his party could supply, and then he will present a good reason why they should receive our suffrages. It is not sufficient to say that their nomination has given them every qualification for office. People are beginning to understand how the nominating machines work. In the State Legislature one good representative who is not ambitious to cut a figure as a flowery orator, but who will let party battles take care of themselves and go quietly to work for the material interests of the county he represents, will do more for the real benefit of his constituents than a half-dozen bitter partisan members who take no interest in anything but beating their political enemies. Let the people of our county remember this when they cast their votes at the coming election. Self-interest, home interest, is always paramount to every other, and even when a legislature is to elect a Senator the people cannot afford to sacrifice the business interests of their own towns and counties to please ambitious politicians. But this is an off year in politics. The legislature to be elected now will not figure at all in political affairs, and consequently the question every voter should ask himself when casting his ballot for Representative is: Who will be able to do the most for this section of the county? We believe there is not a man in the county who could work more successfully for the interests of the people than W. H. Atkinson.

The New York Herald says: "The Illinois Convention is the turning point of the preliminary Republican canvass. It has been so obvious that the success or defeat of Grant as the Republican candidate depended on its action, that the most strenuous and arduous exertions have been made by his opponents to deprive him of the prestige of the Illinois votes in the Republican National Convention. The Grant victory will go for a great deal more than the number of delegates gained. The issue between the candidates for Representative in Lake county at this election is not Democratic or Republican principles "to any great extent," but swamp land men against anti-swamp land men. Mr. Cranston represents the interests of the large holders of swamp land, and Mr. Stearns represents those who are opposed to those interests. The position is generally understood, and upon this issue the contest will be decided. The Times states in its last issue that Mr. Kent was admitted to the "Circuit Court" nearly two years ago. We must confess that we are considerably surprised and rather taken aback at this intelligence, and regard with alarm the narrowness of our escaping ignorance of this event. If he had not received the nomination we should probably never have known that he had been "admitted to Court."

At the California Democratic convention last week Thurman was the favorite of the delegates by a considerable plurality, Tilden and Seymour ranking next, and no other candidate having any respectable backing. The vote for Thurman was 183, for Tilden 97, for Seymour 95. Hendricks had one vote, Hancock two votes, and Field two.

The Douglas Independent has a list of the papers of the state that have joined in the attack upon the members of the present Supreme Court of the state, and includes this paper in the number. This is entirely gratuitous on the part of the Independent, as we have not supported in the least degree the enemies of the Judges.

The Illinois Republican State convention, which met at Springfield on the 20th, declared Grant to be its choice, by a vote of 386 to 307. This, it is generally supposed, will give Grant the nomination on the first ballot, and politicians are beginning to settle themselves for the contest with Grant and Tilden as the figure heads.

An excursion train on the Southern Pacific Coast railroad was thrown from the track near Santa Cruz last Sunday, and fourteen of the passengers were killed and a large number wounded.

The New York Herald is now a full-fledged Grant organ. It will as likely as not support Tilden, however, next week.

We hear it reported to-day that Jacob Ish has refused to accept the nomination for Representative.

He has sired Allie West, sire of Jewett, that has the fastest three-year-old record (2:24) ever made. Alamo's dam by Alexander's Abdallah (see above). Wilburn's dam by Melbourne Jr., sire of Jim Irving, record 2:29; g. d. by Almont, this dam by Imp. Hooton, son of Alexander's Abdallah; g. g. d. by Brigoli, (record 2:29); son of Mambrino Chief, sire of Lady Thorne, record 2:18; and Woodford Mambrino, record 2:21; g. g. d. by Pilot Jr., sire of John Morgan, record 2:24, and dam of Nutwood, record 2:18; g. g. d. by Ole Bull, (sire of Chicago 2:24), son of Old Pilot. Wilburn is very large, highly finished and compactly built.
