GENERAL F. I. APPLIGATE'S SPEECH

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The personal character of the men nominated for the Presidency is but one of the matters to be considered in choosing between them, and the very least in importance.

Let's see: In 1877 Ben Butler was a Republican; in 1878 a Labor Reformer; last year a Greenbacker; and this year he is a Democrat.

It is expected that the present Legislature of our state will undertake the amendment of the laws relating to assessment and taxation—a difficult task for even the profound statesmen of some portions of Oregon.

The trial of Kallach for the murder of DeYoung is being delayed as much as possible. It has been taken into the supreme court of the state on technicalities.

In the Vermont election last week the Republican majority was over 25,000—2,000 greater than the majority for Hayes, and 7,000 more than in 1878.

Four candidates for Congress are now before the people in the northern district of California Republican, Democratic, Greenback and Prohibitionist.

Kearney is again on the sand lots, and promises the San Franciscans another period of "agitating."

A seat in the New York Stock Exchange was sold the other day for \$25,000.

The Oregon Legislature convened on Monday last, and began business without delay. In the Senate, Mr. Hirsch of Multnomah was elected President; J. C. Peables, of Marion, is Chief Clerk; O. Holman, of Douglas, Assistant Clerk; Geo. Tatum, of Polk, Sergeant at Arms; Jos. Acton, of Multnomah, Doorkeeper.

In the House, Z. T. Moody, of Wasco, was elected Speaker; C. B. Moores, of Marion, was elected Chief Clerk, and J. W. Strange, of Douglas, Assistant; E. C. Hadaway, of Yamhill, Sergeant at Arms; T. A. Bacon, of Clackamas, Doorkeeper.

On Tuesday the Senate and House met in joint session and heard the Governor's message read.

In the Senate in the afternoon resolutions were introduced for the appointment of joint committees to inquire into the affairs of the Canal and Locks Commissioners and the management of the Insane Asylum.

THE MAISE ELECTION.

The first news from the election in Maine on Tuesday last caused the Democrats to illuminate and light bonfires, while the Republicans grew thoughtful.
