**DRAMATIC.**—The Vernale dramatic troupe, which has played in Ashland heretofore with excellent success and has attained popularity on all parts of the coast, is coming southward from the Willamette valley and will appear in Houck's Hall in this place on Tuesday evening, Oct. 5th, with entirely new plays, new properties, etc.

**NEARLY DROWNED.**—From Mr. May we learn that on Sunday last, a little son of Wm. Wright, of Linkville, aged about 7 or 8 years, fell from the bridge at that place into the river. Nat. Williams, who saw him fall, plunged into the water at once and succeeded in saving him from the untimely death that was imminent. Mr. Williams has the happy gratitude of the parents of the little boy for his heroic act.

**NEW VARIETIES OF WHEAT.**—Early in the season we made mention of a small patch of "Proper" wheat on Mr. High's farm which promised a heavy yield. There was an acre and a quarter of it, on which 125 lbs of seed was sown. It was threshed last week, and produced 84 bushels. Mr. High has been offered five cents per pound for some of the wheat for seed. He has also received a sack of the White Tuscan wheat from California, which is a great favorite among the farmers where it has been raised.

**MEETING OF HANCOCK CLUB.**—The Ashland Hancock club met in Houck's Hall last Monday evening with a fair attendance. J. D. Fountain, Pres.; P. Lytle, Vice Pres., and N. A. Jacobs, Secretary, all present. The secretary announced that there were upon the roll 91 names, all representing voters of Ashland precinct, while two papers out yet would swell the number to 100 or over. An address was made by Rev. M. Howard, also short remarks by some other gentlemen. The club adjourned to meet next Monday evening.

**ASHLANDERS IN CALIFORNIA.**—Henry Rhodes, who returned to Ashland this week from Yolo county, Cal., stopped in Woodland on his way, and made inquiries concerning the Ashland threshing party. He learned that they were then about 12 miles from town, and would in all probability be kept busy until the rainy season begins. The country is so unprofitable that threshers dislike to venture in from other parts of the state. Several of the Ashland party have learned this to their sorrow. At Shasta's Mr. Rhodes saw Mark Armstrong, who was wanting to come back to Ashland, but was too sick to travel. The other Ashlanders still remaining in that section seem to defy the climate.

**SINGULAR.**—The Jacksonville Times of last week says "Tom Kipper, or Day of Atonement, was generally observed by our citizens of the Jewish faith last Wednesday. A fast of twenty-four hours was maintained, during which their places of business were closed. It is during this period that matzah, or unleavened bread is consumed." Um—Isn't it rather unusual, a little paradoxical, as it were, for the people to be eating when they are fasting? The editor must have become a little misty in his knowledge of the Jewish calendar. The consumption of the matzah, or unleavened bread, usually takes place during the Feast of the Passover, which occurs in the spring.

**TEMPERANCE MEETING.**—A joint committee of the Good Templars and Champions has called a meeting of citizens at the M. E. church in Ashland next Saturday evening to consider the matter of memorializing the Legislature for the passage of a local option law to provide that each county, or each precinct or municipality, may by popular vote decide whether or not intoxicating liquors shall be sold within its limits. Popular movements of a similar character looking toward the securing of such enactment have been inaugurated in other portions of the state, and the temperance people here do not intend to be behindhand in the cause. **STAGE ROBBED ON THE SISKIYOU.**—The south-bound stage, North Edgings driving, which went through Ashland last Thursday evening was robbed by highwaymen about half a mile above the toll house in the Siskiyou mountains. One man came out of the road, presented a gun at the driver and ordered him to stop, and one or two other men were concealed in the brush near by. As the express box was chained to the boot, the masked robber climbed up into the boot, broke it open and took out the contents. He also took out the letter sacks of the mail and then told Nort to drive on. It is reported that about \$1,000 was obtained from the express box and perhaps an equal amount from registered letters. But one passenger was on the stage, a lady, who was inside and was not disturbed. The next morning the mail sacks, which had been cut open, were found near the road, and some of the registered letters were not taken, a package sent from Ashland being unopened. The tracks of two or three men were traced some distance from the place of the robbery, when it was evident that the men had taken off their boots and tied gags about their feet to keep from leaving a trail by which they might be followed. The robbery was at the point where the stage was frequently stopped, a former time, when escape is easy through the thick chaparral either toward the coast or the Klamath Lake country.
