When the innocent Joe did return, the nature of the interview may be imagined. But Wand always insisted that the heroic treatment to which Forrest was subjected, by way of a joke, did more to relieve him from pain than the more moderate treatment he adopted : and, if we are not mistaken, Forrest himself confessed as much when his ruffled temper was soothed, and the cuticular irritation had subsided.

Poultry Raising.

The improved breeds of poultry have made poultry raising profitable on the farm, the increased number of good layers have increased our supply of eggs from basketfuls to car loads, and the large breeds of chickens, ducks, geese and turkeys furnish an important supply of meat sold on the farm. Notwithstanding the opposition made ten years ago to the improved breeds of poultry, the profitable feature has overcome the projudice, and the improved breeds are the rule rather than the exception on most of our Western farms. The poul try interest has so greatly increased in importance with the increase of profits, that more attention is given in supply ing good poultry houses and giving them proper attention. Look well now to the young things, keep them well protected from vermin; clean quarters, clean water and plenty of clean feed.

When cleaning the perches in the poultry house, it is necessary to apply the mixture of kerosene oil and greese to the under side as well as to the top. This is often neglected and the lice gather there.

It is very desirable in raising chickens for market to have some of them come early, as the difference in price realized for the early ones will pay for the extra

If there is one error more apparent than another it is that of allowing too many fowls to run and roost together. - Western Agriculturist.

FOOD FOR THE SICK .- - Frequently we find sick people whose stomachs reject all kinds of nourishment until conditions follow that in many instances terminate fatally. In twenty instances in which I have heard the sick-bed nourishment the simple saucer of parched corn pudding or gruel refused. The corn is roasted brown, precisely as we toast coffee, ground as fine as meal in a coffeemill, and made either into mush, gruel or thin cakes baked lightly brown, and whatever dressing the stomach will receive or retain. Parched corn and meal boiled in skimmed milk, and fed frequently to children suffering from Summer diarrhœa, will almost always cure, as it will dysentery in adults, and, we believe, the cholera in its earliest stages.

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
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
