RACES AT YREKA.

First race was for purse of \$150, trotting, mile heats, 3 in 5. Entered—Stephenson's Sir Walter, D. H. Hyde's bay gelding Bones, J. Beach's Maggie Arnold. Bones distanced first heat.

Second race, single dash of one mile, running. Entered—Marcuse's "Hancock," McKea's "Henry" and Flitner's "Snuff Box." Deal heat between Hancock and Snuff Box, and race postponed until next day; time made, 2 minutes.

Running between Snuff Box and Hancock; won by Snuff Box in 1:56, purse \$50.

Trotting match, 2 in 3, purse \$100. Entered—Cardwell's cream gelding, Alex. Riley's Little Hope, Beach's Altamont and John Cowan's Black Dick. First heat won by Alex. Little Hope second, Altamont third, time 2:57.

Third heat, time 2:44. Entered—Jas. Mose's "Up and Up," Flitner's Ned Smith, Ham's Mayflower. Race won by Ned Smith in second and third heats; time 2:51, 54.

Running, 3 in 5, purse \$125 and entrance fee. Entered—Jas. Mose's Hancock, J. Ham's Mayflower, E. Flitner's Ned Smith. First heat won by Ned Smith, time 1:53, Hancock distanced.

Trotting, mile heats, 2 in 3, free for all four year olds and younger. Entered—Jay Beach's bl. f. Altasia, 2 yrs old; J. Harmon's br. g. Abdallah Boy, 4 yrs old; W. Glendinning's bl. g. Black Frank; A. D. Richards' b. g. Ab, 3 yrs old. Black Frank shut out all the others and won the race in first heat, time 3:15.

Foot Race, 60 yards 2 in 3, purse \$50. Entries—Henry Mentor, of Jacksonville, Wickwire Pendergrast, of Woodland, Cal., Johnny Roberts, of Linkville, and Jas. Miner, of Yreka.

Wickwire Pendergrast, who is a professional runner, was the favorite, with Mentor close. Over \$1,000 was received in the pool box, and twice as much was staked in outside bets. Mentor, who is entirely without experience in professional racing, ran barefooted, the others all being prepared with racing shoes.

After some jockeying, Pendergrast and Roberts started and ran through, Mentor and Miner failing to get a start. This was decided a false start and no heat. Next time they all started, but Miner, who was declared distanced. One of the outcome judges decided that Mentor was six inches ahead, and the other, that Pendergrast was six inches ahead.

The starting judges decided that Mentor was a foot ahead at the start, thus giving the heat to Pendergrast. The time was given by the judges as 61 seconds, but outside parties claimed it was but six.

In the second heat the judges decided that Pendergrast beat by two feet and a half. Roberts ran close up with them both times, but the Oregon boys claim that Miner did not make any effort to run and was only expected to jockey Mentor. The race created great excitement, and attracted more attention than any other contest at the fair.

Trotting Race, two-mile heats, 2 in 3, purse \$150 and entrance. Entries—Jay Beach's Maggie Arnold, Geo. Stephenson's Sir Walter, D. H. Hyde's b. g. Bones. First heat won by Sir Walter, Maggie second, time 5:39. Second heat won by Bones in 5:28. Third heat won by Sir Walter, time 5:37.

It was evident to the spectators that in the trotting race the first day of the fair Sir Walter carried off the purse easily, but in the last race he was pushed to his utmost.

Jay Beach's fine stock attracted much attention, and received general praise. In the trotting race of the third day his black filly Altasia, only two years old made a splendid showing, and was a great favorite.
