Townsite Contest Ended. The contest between Jonathan Bourne, Jr., the owner of the original townsite of Grants Pass, and Sol Abraham, the owner of the addition, over the location of the court house, which the county commissioners had decided to build in Sol's addition, has been brought to a settlement, it is said, by Abraham selling his land to Bourne.

Found Dead. Henry Carter living at Squaw Lake in this county left his home a few days before New Year with the intention of hunting some cattle that had strayed off. It coming back a search was instituted this week by his neighbors when his dead body was found in the mountains some distance from his home.

Enigrant Creek High. The water in Enigrant creek was higher last Saturday than it had been any time since the freshet of five years ago, when the stage and team was lost in the ford near Soda Springs.

Marshall Taylor gives notice that he is ready to begin the collection of the municipal tax. High water in Enigrant creek has detained the Linkville mail twice within a week past.

Prohibition Organization. Pursuant to the call of the Central Committee, a large number of the citizens of Ashland assembled at Meyer's hall for the purpose of organizing the Prohibition party in Jackson county.

On motion Amos Willis was chosen temporary chairman, and J. E. Houston secretary. The following committees were selected: Com. on organization, Messrs J. E. Houston, J. H. Russell and W. H. Stillwell.

On motion the club elected the following permanent officers: President, J. E. Houston; Vice Presidents, J. D. Fountain and Benj. Eggleston; Secretary, W. S. Gore; Treasurer, J. H. Russell.

The following delegates to the State Temperance Alliance, were elected: Messrs D. C. Herrin, J. H. Mayfield and C. A. Nutley.

Messrs Benj. Eggleston and J. D. Fountain were appointed a committee for organization in the county. The Secretary was instructed to furnish the Tidings with a copy of the proceedings of the meeting.

Great interest was manifested, and we trust a nucleus formed around which the Prohibition sentiment of the county will be organized and work be encouraged that will result in the destruction of our country's curse.

The mountains surrounding our favored valley protect it well from the storm winds that have been sweeping the Pacific slope from Alaska to Panama during the past fortnight. The barometer went down low in Ashland last week, as it did everywhere on the coast. We had plenty of rain, but our mountain walls on every side sheltered us closely from the heavy winds that played havoc in many places.

The storm of last Saturday in Siskiyou county was accompanied by a violent wind, which did not, however, do any serious damage. Yreka, owing to its sheltered position, escaped the wind. Vias would no doubt be much pleased with the reduced mail facilities between this place and Portland at present if he were informed that we are not likely to have more than one through mail in a week.

Besides the large building to be used as a saw and door factory at Grant's Pass, the Sugar Pine Lumber Manufacturing Co. will also put up a large warehouse, in which to store the products of the factory. The freight train came no further south than Roseburg this week. It may reach Ashland next week, and may not, probably not, unless the extensive repairs needed on the road be completed sooner than is anticipated.

DAMAGE TO THE RAILROADS.

The thorough soaking of the ground has revealed the weak places in the newly constructed railroad between this place and Roseburg, and numerous landslides and several instances of displacement of the track by the settling of the roadbed have resulted. The most extensive obstruction to trains was an immense slide at the south end of tunnel 9, where the track was covered for a distance of 800 feet, the debris being in some places 25 feet deep, and covering the whole entrance of the tunnel. This occurred Saturday night. On Thursday night there had been a slide between Almaden and tunnel 8, which delayed the trains about ten hours. Sunday evening there was a slide at Bloody run, this side of Grants Pass, covering the track four feet deep for a distance of some forty feet. Besides these accidents there are also reported to have been a small slide at the north end of tunnel 9, a slide at the north end of tunnel 8, and a sink in the roadbed in Gow Creek canyon between West Fork and Myrtle Creek.

On Monday Superintendent Brandt came out as far as tunnel 9, and ordered an engine and extra forces from Roseburg to clear the obstruction. All the available hands from this end of the track were also ordered to Bloody Run and tunnel 9, and work has been kept going there night and day.

On Wednesday evening the following injuries to the road were reported in addition to those enumerated. A large landslide on Grave Creek mountain, two miles south of Alton, slides at the north end of tunnel 1, a washout a thousand feet along the track at the north end of tunnel 6, a big washout at the north end of tunnel 7, and last week the Roseburg creek another big washout and cave which has left the track and ties suspended in the air in places.

From Engineer McCarty, on his return from the Pacific coast, he reports that the Klamath River parties in need of their freight. The Board of Directors of the Northern Pacific Railroad has authorized the letting of a contract for a tunnel two miles long, at the mouth of the Klamath mountains to Nelson Bennett of Deer Lodge, M. T. The tunnel will cost nearly \$800,000 and will be completed by May 1st next.

A match running race has been arranged to come off at the Yreka track Saturday, Feb. 6th, for \$250 a side, between Joe Stephens' Jubilee and Harry Stever's Quebec. The forfeit money, \$75, is held by J. M. Wadridge. Both horses are in good condition and will go into active training at once.—[Union.]

Toole, a lame Indian well known in Pendleton as Morse's Indian, was found frozen to death near the town Sunday morning of last week. He left town early Saturday evening under the influence of liquor, and while plodding home to his wigwam was overcome by the deadly arctic wind and laid down to sleep in the snow, to awake no more.

The Redding Independent of last Saturday says: "We were shown to-day a large, flat piece which was heavily coated on one side with gold, giving it the appearance of a nugget. It was found in the gravel diggings near Copley, and the finder thought at first he had beaten the record for big nuggets. The specimen is now in the hands of John George, who will place it in his cabinet."

Down in Southern California there have been damaging floods during the storms of the past two weeks. At Los Angeles the river rose to such a height as to flood the lower part of the city and destroy many houses and other property. The damage altogether to city property, garden lands, etc. in the vicinity is reckoned at from \$150,000 to \$200,000, and several lives were lost through drowning. A dispatch of 26th from Stockton says: "What is known as Moss tract is completely inundated and damaged to the extent of \$50,000. Leaves about Robert Island brook and 13,000 acres of grain were submerged. Damage at latter place will reach \$300,000."
