A TERRIBLE TRAGEDY.

On Thursday morning last the people Waldo, Josephine county, were hor rified to find the dead body of Thoma Bybee lying in the trail leading from that place to his claim. He was found to have been killed by a gunshot wound in the neck, just below the right ear, where within the space of but a few inches sixteen buckshot were found. His neck was considerably powder-burned, show-ing the shot to have been fired at very close range. In the dead man's left hand was found a revolver, one chamber of which was empty. A coroner's inquest was held on Friday and the jury rendered a verdict closing with the decision tha the deceased came to his death by the hand of some party to the jury unknown. Mrs. Bybee, widow of the murdered man, swore out a warrant against Ex-

Sheriff William Bybee, of this county uncle of the deceased, charging him with the murder. On Saturday Wm. Bybee was arrested and had a preliminary examination in justice's court at Kerbyvill on Tuesday and Wednesday of this week. as a result of which he was held without bail to appear before the next grand jury in answer to the charge of murder in the first degree. As there is no jail yet at the new county seat of Josephine county, Mr. Bybee has been brought to Jacksonville to await the opening of circuit court in Josephine county. At the preliminary examination the State was rep-

resented by District Attorney Kent and S. U. Mitchell, and the defense by Judge Hanna. It is fresh in the public mind that Wn Bybee was shot in the leg by his nephew, the deceased, some two months or so ago. This trouble between the men of course turned attention toward Wm. Bybee immediately upon the discovery of the dead man. Evidence against him is entirely circumstantial. Wm. Bybee and Thomas Bybee were both in Waldo on Wednesday, but no words passed between them, so far as known. Wm. Bybee had a double-barreled shot gun which he was showing in the store at that place. and mentioned that he had some cart ridges loaded with fine shot and some with buckshot. Wm. Bybee left Waldo dersigned or to G. F. Billings. about 7 in the evening, taking the trai from that place to his mining claim. Thomas Bybee started from Waldo over the same trail, leading his horse, about an hour later. Some time between 8 and 9 o'clock two reports of a gun or other weapon were heard by some men living near Wm. Bybee's claim. They testified that Wm. Bybee reached his cabin about 9 o'clock, having his gun with him. Someone asked him if he had shot something. He replied that he had not fired
